## Player Profiles (Alphabetical by Position)

### Centers

#### [Andrea Bargnani, C, TOR](#)

Although he wasn't as durable as he's been in recent seasons, playing just 66 games, Bargnani posted a career-high 21.4 points per game last year. But general manager Bryan Colangelo was not happy with the production he got from the 25-year-old Italian. Colangelo believes the Raptors need a strong inside presence and the 7-footer plays mostly on the wing as he averaged just 5.2 rebounds per game with 0.7 blocks, but did nail 77 3-pointers with more than one per game. Toronto used guys like Ed Davis, Reggie Evans and Amir Johnson to do the rebounding, but Colangelo would prefer the center do that job in a perfect world. That said, Toronto certainly doesn't live in a perfect world and it will be Bargnani as the man in the middle once again. He might not be the prototypical center, but he still does enough to be considered a low-end No. 1 option at the thin position. Bargnani can be considered in the second tier of NBA centers on Draft Day.

#### [Andris Biedrins, C, GS](#)

Andris Biedrins has been plagued by injuries the last two seasons, but took an aggressive approach toward remedying that situation going into the upcoming season with a strict physical and mental training program. Biedrins has played in just 92 games the last two seasons after averaging 11.9 points and 11.2 rebounds with 1.5 blocks per game during the 2008-09 season. General manager Larry Riley has expressed his optimism that Biedrins could return to that level of production, though we aren't quite as hopeful. With David Lee around, the touches simply are not there for him to approach that type of production again on a regular basis. But there do appear to be signs of improvement this season for Biedrins, who will be available in the late rounds in Fantasy drafts and could be a good value pick as a No. 3 or 4 center to stash in the hopes he might recapture some of his lost productivity. At his best, Biedrins offered premium field-goal percentage, something that still remained true even in his down years. However, be aware of his toxic free-throw percentage in category play.

#### [DeJuan Blair, C, SA](#)

DeJuan Blair enjoyed modest increases across the board during his second NBA season. In Year No. 3, we expect his progression to remain along the same lines, though the chances for a significant jump are there. As the Spurs continue to try to ease the workload of an aging Tim Duncan, Blair will be asked to take on more, especially in terms of rebounding and defense. That should buy him more minutes this season, likely approaching 30 minutes per contest for the first time. Offensively, Fantasy owners should not expect much more than about nine points per game, however, what he can offer in rebounds, blocks and steals alone could qualify him as a top-25 center option in Fantasy.

#### [Andrew Bogut, C, MIL](#)

Andrew Bogut was bothered all of last season by the elbow and hand injuries that he suffered in a nasty fall late in the 2009-10 campaign. He played in just 65 games last year and once again needed surgery on his right elbow during the offseason. However, injuries always seem to be the concern for the 26-year-old, as he has missed a total of 76 games over the last three seasons. He has proved to be more than capable of producing when he is on the floor. Despite playing most of last season at less than 100 percent and with only one working arm, Bogut still averaged 12.8 points per contest to go along with a career-best 11.1 rebounds and 2.6 blocks. That marked the third straight season he averaged over a double-double, only this time he did it while shooting a career-low 49.5 percent from the field and 44 percent from the charity stripe. Those numbers are sure to go up if Bogut can use his right arm this season, which he reportedly will be able to do. While his injury history might scare a few owners away, his production continues to rank him as one of the elite Fantasy centers in all formats. As long as Bogut is fully recovered, he can be considered a No.1 Fantasy center heading into Draft Day.

#### [Matt Bonner, C, SA](#)

Matt Bonner is not a player that will be targeted in most Fantasy drafts, but that doesn't mean he will not be of use this season. The center-eligible big man is an above-average 3-point shooter who can help owners in category leagues for help in that area. He averaged 1.6 3-pointers made per game last season and can be viewed as a favorable starting option in deeper formats when facing matchups against teams that allow high-volume shot attempts and have trouble defending the perimeter.

#### [Kwame Brown, C, GS](#)

Brown was one of the few pleasant surprises in Fantasy last season, as a strong second half made him relevant in more than a few formats. After getting off to his typical slow start, Brown really played well over the final two months of last season. He averaged 9.4 points and 7.0 rebounds per contest in the 25 games following the All-Star break and really seemed to thrive under the tutelage of head coach Paul Silas. While Brown has been in the league for nine seasons now, it is still possible he has not reached his ceiling yet. Silas thinks Brown is just getting started and many feel he can get his scoring back into double-digits this season. However, we understand the how some owners may be reluctant to pull the trigger on Brown based on his track record. Still, because center is such a thin position, consider grabbing Brown in the later rounds on Draft Day as a No. 2 center option.

#### [Andrew Bynum, C, LAL](#)

It was pretty much the same old story for Andrew Bynum during the 2010-11 regular season. He once again missed significant time due to his troublesome left knee (28 games), but showed flashes of his great potential when he was able to stay on the court. Bynum averaged 11.3 points and 9.4 rebounds during his sixth year in the league while shooting an impressive 57.4 percent from the field. While he did play extremely well during the postseason, Bynum displayed some of his immaturity when he decided to take a cheap shot at Dallas guard Jose Juan Barea in Los Angeles' final playoff game. That little stunt will now cost him the first five games of the next regular season, likely putting him out of commission for the first scoring period. Bynum will also have to answer to a new boss as Phil Jackson is no longer running the show in L.A. Mike Brown has taken over the as head coach and has already said the Lakers will not run their now notorious triangle offense. Instead, Brown will try and run the offense more through Bynum and fellow 7-footer Pau Gasol. However, the ball will still wind up in Kobe Bryant's hands more often than not, so don't expect the 23-year-old to suddenly become the focal point of the offense. While the talent is clearly there, Bynum's immaturity and consistent injury problems continue to stunt his development. He has now missed at least 17 games in each of the last four seasons and is already guaranteed to miss five this season. Despite being considered a No. 1 Fantasy C, owners should wait until the middle-rounds before taking Bynum.

#### [Tyson Chandler, C, NY](#)

Tyson Chandler's first season in Dallas was one of his most productive seasons of his career. Coming off a year during which he averaged just 6.5 points and 6.2 rebounds per game with the Bobcats, he fell just half-a-rebound per game shy of averaging a double-double for the year for a second time in his career. Much like he did in his best days in New Orleans when he was partnered up with Chris Paul, Chandler took advantage of great looks from the likes of Jason Kidd to put in easy finish after easy finish. The result was a career-best 65.4 shooting percentage that Fantasy owners can get plenty of use out of in Rotisserie and category formats. Expect another season of nine-plus boards and over a block per game as long as he can stay healthy, qualifying him as a solid No. 2 center.

#### [DeMarcus Cousins, C, SAC](#)

As a rookie, DeMarcus Cousins seemed to be the only person who could slow him down. He was a disciplinary nightmare for head coach Paul Westphal, who had to bench him on more than one occasion. However, when he was on the court, his production could not be ignored. The addition of J.J. Hickson in the offseason will likely crowd an already crowded front court that also features another promising young forward in Jason Thompson. However, Cousins will likely get plenty of playing time alongside Hickson at the center position and will remain a focal point of the team's offense in the low post. Hickson's presence could keep a cap on any potential increase to his scoring average in Cousins' sophomore season, but we anticipate Cousins to enjoy at least modest increases this season. Consider Cousins a safe pick around the fifth round of any league. He could average over a block per game to go with solid production in steals. Owners in category play should be aware of his high turnover rate and poor free-throw shooting.

### **Samuel Dalembert, C, FA**

Samuel Dalembert proved he can be useful to Fantasy owners even in a bench role in his first season with the Kings. Despite starting just 46 games, his lowest total since his rookie season, he averaged a very useful 8.2 rebounds and 1.5 blocks per game. Never much of an offensive weapon, Dalembert remains capable of chipping in around 10 points per game, but his main asset to Fantasy owners remains what he can offer in boards and blocks. View him as a viable No. 3 center to snag in the late rounds as a potential backup to be used, as needed, throughout the season.

### **Channing Frye, C, PHO**

Channing Frye is coming off a career season in many aspects and, at 28 years of age, could be able to improve upon his numbers. Frye has bounced around as a center and a power forward, but the Suns finally settled on him as a power-forward only player last year and it paid off. A big man (6-11) with a solid mid-to-long range game, Frye can play his best facing the basket and starting from the wing. He is among the premiere 3-point shooters in the game right now, regardless of position, fourth in 3-pointers made last season with 176. That alone provides a huge boost to his value in category play and when you consider the fact he is eligible at center in leagues that allow for multiple positions it makes him that much more desirable as a player to target in the middle rounds. Frye won't give you the numbers most owners seek from big men. The 6.6 rebounds he averaged last year were a career high and his field-goal percentage is low considering his lower percentage shot arsenal, so Fantasy owners who decide to go with Frye in the middle rounds on Draft Day are advised to make up for these deficits elsewhere.

### **Marc Gasol, C, MEM**

Marc Gasol's production took a step back in his third NBA season, returning to the level of his rookie season after enjoying some significant improvements in scoring and rebounds during the 2009-10 season. He is capable of being a mid-teens scorer who can provide around eight or nine boards per game, but the presence of Zach Randolph in Memphis caps what he might otherwise be able to offer. Count on his 2010-11 numbers as a lock, as long as he stays healthy. That would qualify him as at least a low-end No. 1 center option, as it did last season. And, at just 26 years of age, the possibility of a breakout season still remains a distinct possibility.

### **Marcin Gortat, C, PHO**

A change of scenery did Marcin Gortat a world of good last season, and may have turned him into a Fantasy superstar at the center position. In 55 games after being traded from Orlando to Phoenix, he averaged 13.0 points and 9.3 rebounds per game. All but 12 of those games came off the bench, but he made the most of his first chance at extended run at the NBA level. Seemingly destined to be Dwight Howard's caddy in Orlando, Gortat beat out Robin Lopez in Phoenix for playing time -- even if he wasn't technically the 'starter' for the Suns. Starter or not, expect Gortat to be given the same type of playing time in 2011-12, now with the opportunity to do it over an entire season. Count on him for double-double caliber production with over a block per game and useful numbers in steals. He doesn't take many low percentage shots and should remain a premium option for field-goal percentage. Although he doesn't yet have the established track record of some of the reliable No. 1 center options, Gortat should be looked upon as a possible low-end No. 1 or high-end No. 2 center going into the season.

### **Spencer Hawes, C, PHI**

Hawes will once again enter the 2011-12 season as Philadelphia's starting center. He played in and started 81 games last year in the middle for the 76ers, averaging 7.2 points and 5.7 rebounds per game. Although he starts down low, it is forward Elton Brand who pulls down the majority of rebounds for Doug Collins and Philadelphia. Even though Hawes started in more games for Philly than he ever did with Sacramento, he saw fewer minutes and his scoring, rebounding and blocked shots all took a hit. Things should stay pretty much the same this year and Hawes could even lose minutes to Marresse Speights. Because centers are so hard to come by in Fantasy, Hawes can still be targeted late in Fantasy drafts. Consider him just inside the top 30 Fantasy centers on Draft Day.

### **Chuck Hayes, C, FA**

With Yao Ming retired, Chuck Hayes remains the team's top option at center. While most of the offensive touches inside should continue to go through Luis Scola, Hayes should scrape together about 8-10 points on most nights due to his 30 minutes or so of playing time. That type of run allowed him to average a career-high eight boards per game last season to go with nearly a block per game. Count on him as a reliable third option at center to be taken late in drafts as a backup option. Barring any significant changes under the team's new coaching staff, Hayes should be in position for similar production.

### **Brendan Haywood, C, DAL**

Brendan Haywood is just a season removed from averaging 9.8 points and 10.4 rebounds over 49 games for the Wizards before he was traded to the Mavericks. He averaged 8.1 points and 7.4 rebounds over the remainder of that season with the Mavs, but the addition of Tyson Chandler for the 2010-11 season severely lit into Haywood's minutes and touches. At 31, Haywood is still more than capable of putting up near double-double production if given the playing time. However, Fantasy owners should look to him as no more than a potential stashee candidate late in drafts given the limited playing time ahead of him as long as Chandler is healthy.

### **Roy Hibbert, C, IND**

Roy Hibbert is coming off his most productive year as a pro in 2010-11. The 24-year-old averaged a career-high 12.7 points, 7.5 rebounds and 2.0 assists per contest while starting 80 games during his third year in the league. However, Hibbert's most productive year also turned out to be his most inconsistent. He went through more than a few tough stretches during the regular season where he struggled to score and even sought out the help of a sports psychologist to help him fix his offensive game. He seemed to find a spark when Frank Vogel was brought on as the interim head coach back in January. The 24-year-old averaged 13.2 points and 7.0 rebounds under Vogel, who was hired as the full-time coach after the season. The Pacers' new coach wants Hibbert to work on getting closer to the basket and the big man has been working on getting stronger in order to become more of a finisher near the rim. Many feel Hibbert's fourth year in the league could be his best yet, as he has not even close to reaching his ceiling. At the very least, Fantasy owners should be able to count on around 11-12 points a night to go along with around seven rebounds and 1.5 blocks. That makes him a more-than-viable option in most formats at the extremely thin center position. While he certainly is not one of the elite center options available, Hibbert is certainly worthy of a mid-round pick in most formats on Draft Day.

### **Al Horford, C, ATL**

Horford once again established himself among the elite Fantasy options at the center position last season. Not only did he average over nine rebounds and a block a game for the third straight season, the 25-year-old also improved his offensive production during his fourth year in the league, averaging 15.3 ppg while shooting a whopping 55.7 percent from the floor. Both were career highs for Horford, who has now been able to increase his scoring output in each of his first four seasons. He has reportedly been working on his post game this offseason, so there is no reason to think that trend won't continue moving forward. Horford could also finally get some run at power forward next season with the Hawks drafting rookie Keith Benson, which should matchup him up against smaller defenders. No matter where Horford ends up playing, Fantasy owners know what they are going to get from the former University of Florida standout. A solid big man, who shoots the ball well, stays healthy and still has upside. That makes Horford a very safe pick in the early rounds in either Head-to-Head or category-based leagues as a No. 1 center.

### **Dwight Howard, C, ORL**

Dwight Howard is coming off another huge statistical year that resulted in the 25-year-old earning his third straight NBA Defensive Player of the Year Award. After hitting a bit of a ceiling with his scoring over the last few seasons, Howard looked to establish himself more on the offensive end of the court and did so splendidly. The perennial All-Star spent countless hours in the gym working on post moves, which helped him average a career-best 22.9 points per game while shooting just under 60 percent from the floor (59.3). Despite his free-throw percentage once again being awful (59.6 percent), Howard finally showed some growth in his offensive game and more confidence in his jump shot, evidenced by his 13.4 shot attempts per game. That trend should continue moving forward as Howard continues to refine his game in the post and extend his range farther from the basket. He again was a machine on the glass, averaging 14.1 rebounds per contest -- second only to Kevin Love -- and posting 66 double-doubles. His poor free-throw percentage and constant foul trouble can be a bit irritating at times to Fantasy owners, but Howard's 2.4 blocks and 1.4 steals per contest more than make up the difference. As owners already know by now, there aren't too many players out there -- especially big men -- who can even come close to matching Howard's production. He is arguably one of the most dominant players in the league and without question should be the first center taken off the board on Draft Day next season, regardless of format.

### **Al Jefferson, C, UTA**

Al Jefferson put together a solid 2010-11 campaign during his first season in Utah, averaging 18.6 points, 9.7 rebounds and a career-best 1.9 blocks per contest. He also logged 37-double-doubles and played in all 82 games for just the second time in his career. The original plan was for the 26-year-old to play some center and forward for the Jazz, but injuries and the strong play of Paul Millsap forced him to spend the most of the season playing the five. He will have some competition though, as the club drafted Enes Kanter with the No. 3 overall pick in this summer's draft. Still, the team wants him to play more power forward this season and is reportedly considering moving Millsap in the middle. No matter what position he plays, Jefferson can be counted on to put up close to a double-double every night, to go along with a handful of assists and a block. He finished as the third highest-scoring center, in terms of Fantasy points, in all CBSSports.com standard formats and is certainly worth selecting in the early rounds on Draft Day.

### **DeAndre Jordan, PF/C, LAC**

Lingering ankle and knee injuries suffered by Chris Kaman last season allowed DeAndre Jordan to get his first real chance to be an everyday starter in the NBA. He started 66 of 80 games, averaging 7.5 points and 7.8 rebounds with 1.8 blocks in those games. He will find it hard to match that type of production this season if both Chris Kaman and Blake Griffin remain healthy, but should remain a reliable source for blocks in category play and is worth drafting with a late-round pick, especially if you spent a mid-round pick on Kaman.

### **Chris Kaman, C, NO**

A devastating ankle injury sidelined C Chris Kaman for nearly three months at the beginning of last season and he struggled to recover. Though he returned to action in February, he never seemed to be 100 percent and a knee injury later in the year capped his disappointing season. Yet Kaman earns a fresh start this season following a trade to New Orleans in December. Kaman, who spent eight years with the Clippers, is just one season removed from averaging 18.5 points and 9.2 rebounds per game. Kaman is still capable of registering the numbers he did in 2009-10, but don't anticipate 15.8 shot attempts per game as he's expected to play behind C Emeka Okafor with the Hornets. Fantasy owners should target Kaman in the middle rounds of 2011-12 drafts.

### **Nenad Krstic, C, BOS**

The Celtics aren't currently sure if they will have the services of Krstic entering the 2011-12 season as the center has signed a two-year contract with CSKA Moscow overseas. That said, there is still a chance the 28-year-old Yugoslavian big man starts down low for Doc Rivers' team as he did after coming over from Oklahoma City last year. Krstic, unlike teammate Jeff Green, actually improved his value in Fantasy after coming over from the Thunder. He picked up his scoring and increased his rebounding by one full board per game. Averaging 9.1 points, 5.4 boards and a solid field goal percentage over 20 games with Boston last year, Krstic would be a worthy Fantasy center at a thin position in 2011-12. Consider him with a late-round draft pick as he's among the top 40 Fantasy centers in the NBA.

### **David Lee, C/PF, GS**

After making 68 of his 73 starts at power forward last season, David Lee lost his center eligibility for the 2011-12 season. His scoring also dipped roughly four points per game after going from the Knicks to the Warriors as he saw his shot attempts per game decline from 15.5 to 13.4. This year, under coach Mark Jackson's more orthodox approach, the Warriors may slow things down and that could lead to a further decline in his numbers, but we do not anticipate a dramatic fall in production. After all, the team's current personnel will not lead to a very drastic change in approach in Jackson's first year as he inherited a team built to run. Expect Lee to average around 16 points and 10 rebounds per game again with healthy totals in assists and about a steal per game. He should continue to average more than 50 percent from the field and will remain a safe pick in round three or four in most Fantasy formats.

### **Brook Lopez, C, NJ**

Lopez started all 82 games for the Nets for the second consecutive season and finished in the top 20 in the NBA in scoring average with more than 20 points per game last year. Also blocking more than a shot and a half per game, Lopez surely was one of the best and brightest Fantasy centers around. Unfortunately, there was one mysterious part of his game that went missing last year as he grabbed just 5.9 rebounds per game after averaging around 8.5 over his first two NBA seasons. Where did the rebounding go? Was Lopez just soft for the Nets, or was the addition of Kris Humphries enough to take the rebounding onus away from the Stanford product? Either way, you have to expect coach Avery Johnson to ask more of Lopez in that regard this season. Plus, even if Lopez has a similar season rebounding, he'll still remain a No. 1 Fantasy center through thick and thin. Lopez should be among the first 10 centers taken and he's approaching elite status if he can just improve those rebounding numbers back to where they were his first two years in the league.

### **Robin Lopez, C, PHO**

Robin Lopez did not come into the league with the same expectations as his twin brother, Brook. That is a good thing, considering the mediocre numbers Lopez has put up over his first three NBA seasons. Lopez has enjoyed brief spells of viability, but his inconsistency opened the door for Marcin Gortat to emerge as a potential star center last season after he was acquired via trade from the Magic. Lopez remained the team's starter, but in practice only. While Lopez took the opening tip in games and was announced during player introductions, it was Gortat who played the most minutes and did all the heavy lifting. As long as Gortat remains healthy this season, that should once again be the case. But don't expect much out of Lopez even if he finds himself in a situation to play a more primary role, he has proven that he can't be trusted for more than a random productive stat line every now and again.

### **JaVale McGee, C, WAS**

Everyone has seen JaVale McGee make the highlight dunks and ridiculous blocks, but many wondered if he had the skill set and discipline to actually establish himself as a quality big man in this league. Although, after putting up career highs in starts (74), points (10.1), rebounds (8.1) and blocks (2.4), some of those doubts may have been put to rest. McGee had his most productive season as a pro during the 2010-11 campaign and really polished some aspects of his game. However, there are still some maturity issues with the 7-footer, who was suspended for getting into a fight with teammate Andray Blatche at a nightclub and also had his fair share of run ins with coach Flip Saunders. Still, at age 23, McGee hasn't reached his ceiling yet, which is scary considering the numbers he averaged in less than 30 minutes a game last season. He looks to have all the makings of an elite Fantasy center for years to come, although he isn't quite there yet. Consider McGee a No. 2 center worthy of a mid-to-late-round pick on Draft Day.

### **Darko Milicic, C, MIN**

So Darko Milicic will never live up to the potential Pistons president Joe Dumars saw in him when he selected him with the second overall pick in the 2003 NBA Draft. We all know that. That doesn't mean he can't help Fantasy owners, though. He is coming off his most productive season to date, averaging 8.8 points and 5.2 rebounds in 69 games played. Those numbers are not particularly attractive, but the 2.0 blocks per game he averaged can be extra helpful in category play and there were moments last season where he showed he could have even more to offer given increased playing time. He scored 20-plus points per game in three straight contests last November, when he averaged over 35 minutes per game. Do not invest much more than a late-round pick in Darko, but you could find him useful as a stopgap center throughout the season in leagues that require starting two centers.

### **Nazr Mohammed, C, OKC**

Due mostly to injuries and a general lack of depth at the position in Charlotte, Nazr Mohammed was given 37 starts last season. He averaged just 18.2 minutes in those starts and seems unlikely to be able to handle much more playing time than that even in a best-case scenario. That best-case scenario for Mohammed last season saw him average 7.9 points, 5.0 rebounds and 1.0 blocks per game. While Fantasy owners might still get occasional use out of him under those conditions as a possible stopgap measure at the weak center position, he is a player that should be available off the waiver wire.

### **Timofey Mozgov, C, DEN**

Once Mozgov was traded from the Knicks to the Nuggets mid-season, his playing time went from 13.5 minutes per game to just six. He went from averaging four points and three boards to just 2.5 and 1.5 over 11 games with the Nuggets. As long as Nene is in town, Mozgov is going to come off the bench for the Nuggets. That said, coach George Karl expects much bigger things from the 25-year-old Russian entering 2011-12. Karl has mentioned Mozgov could get around 25 minutes per contest if he shows improvement in his second NBA season. The 7-foot center has high upside and displayed that at times with the Knicks as he entered last year with plenty of sleeper appeal. That is exactly how he'll enter this season. He comes with major upside as a Fantasy sleeper, but there is still a lot of unknowns when it comes to Mozgov. The uncertainty creates intriguing value at such a thin position, however, and makes Mozgov worthy of a late-round Fantasy flier on Draft Day.

### **Nene, C, DEN**

Nene has been a name in the NBA since dropping 10.5 points and 6.1 rebounds per game as a 20-year-old rookie back in 2002-03 for the Nuggets. That said, he struggled to stay healthy and keep any kind of consistency over his first handful of NBA seasons. That has really changed over the last three campaigns. Nene has averaged over 14 points and 7.5 rebounds per game with 2.0 steals and a block over that span and is arguably coming off his best season as a 28-year-old. Nene saw 31 minutes per game last year with Denver and scored 14.5 points, grabbed 7.6 rebounds and blocked and stole a shot per game while leading the league with a 61.5 field goal percentage. A solid free throw shooter for a center, Nene is entering his 10th NBA season as one of the best Fantasy centers at a very thin position. The Brazilian has played at least 75 games in three straight seasons and has been able to stave off the injury bug. As long as that continues, Fantasy owners should consider Nene among the NBA's Fantasy elite at the center spot. He's just inside the top 10 Fantasy centers and should be targeted right after the first few rounds on Draft Day.

### **Joakim Noah, C, CHI**

Despite being limited to just 48 games a season ago, Noah took his game to the next level in 2010-11. He traded some rebounding for more offense and averaged a career-high 11.7 points per contest. He averaged more than 14 points per game before undergoing surgery on his right thumb in December and held his own after returning in February. His rebounding and prowess for always being around the loose ball also increases his chances of putting up more stats. The Bulls do not need his scoring with the likes of Derrick Rose, Luol Deng and Carlos Boozer on the squad but Fantasy owners would definitely love to see him progress as an offensive threat. Even if he doesn't, his ability to rebound, block shots and collect a couple of steals every now and then makes him an ideal candidate in Rotisserie formats. If he could ever develop a reliable jumpshot he would become more valuable in Fantasy, but Noah should still be able to average a double-double for the third straight campaign so consider him as a low-end No. 1/high-end No. 2 Fantasy C in all formats on Draft Day.

### **Jermaine O'Neal, C, BOS**

Boston C Jermaine O'Neal has avoided surgery and enters the 2011-12 season healthy with his wrist feeling close to 100 percent. That is the good news. The bad news is that O'Neal only played in 24 games last year with Boston and averaged 5.4 points, 3.6 rebounds and 1.3 blocks over 18 minutes per night. But he has improved his strength following the retirement of Shaquille O'Neal and is in line for a starting role this year. A healthy Jermaine O'Neal shouldn't be expected to post more than 10-15 points per game, and his health is always a question mark. It's doubtful O'Neal is going to stay healthy the entire season so he should be viewed as a last-round option only in deeper Fantasy formats for the 2011-12 season.

### **Greg Oden, C, POR**

This is starting to sound repetitive. Portland C Greg Oden has gone from No. 1 overall pick in the NBA Draft to a reclamation project due to a series of knee operations. He had his entire 2010-11 season wiped out due to microfracture surgery and could be sidelined again for the 2011-12 campaign, crippling the chances of Oden emerging as the superstar he was once expected to be in years past. He averaged 11.1 points and 8.4 rebounds in just 21 games in 2009-10, playing 23.9 minutes per game. As one of the biggest question marks heading into the season, Oden should not be considered a worthwhile selection in 2011-12 Fantasy drafts as the injury risk is too great.

### **Emeka Okafor, C, NO**

Since joining the New Orleans Hornets, Emeka Okafor has been a consistent source for about 10 points and nine boards per game, averaging the same figures in each of his first two seasons with the team. He has a good rapport with point guard Chris Paul and could even conceivably get back to the 13-ppg level he enjoyed throughout his time with the Bobcats. But Fantasy owners should expect another season of consistent production with premium help for category league owners in blocks. Just be aware of his putrid free-throw shooting (58.7 percent for his career) in those formats. View him as a solid No. 2 center option to target in the mid-to-late rounds in any format.

### **Mehmet Okur, C, UTA**

Mehmet Okur was plagued by an Achilles' injury and back issues last season, limiting him to just 13 games. In none of those was Okur even near 100 percent. He went home to Turkey to rehab and claims to be going into the season in much better condition. However, the 32-year-old is no longer looking at a starting job and will likely have to settle for around 20-25 minutes off the bench unless he can earn his way into a more prominent role. A solid perimeter scorer at 6-11, he can create matchup problems for opponents and will still be a useful weapon for his team. Do not write him completely off. He is unlikely to return to the 17-2-8 level of production he enjoyed in 2008-09, but could still be a double-digit scorer and decent rebounder if given enough playing time. Target him in the later rounds as a reserve center option.

### **Kendrick Perkins, C, OKC**

When Perkins went from Boston to Oklahoma City last season, it did not have the desired effect. The move did not put the Thunder over the top as they failed to advance to the NBA Finals. In fact, Perkins' numbers tumbled after changing addresses and his entire season was mostly lost to a knee injury. He played in 12 games for the Celtics before being traded and averaged 7.3 points, 8.1 rebounds and shot 54 percent from the field. After being traded, Perkins averaged just 5.1 points, 7.9 boards and shot 49 percent over 25 minutes per game. Perkins makes perfect sense as the tough center anchor for an exciting young offensive squad led by Kevin Durant and Russell Westbrook. Still, he'll have to show major improvement to get back to his 2009-10 level when he averaged 10 points, eight rebounds and 1.7 blocks per game over 28 minutes per night for the Celtics. Perkins himself was disappointed with his performance last year and has vowed to lose weight and be more focused entering the 2011-12 year. Perkins has said that the injuries lingered, even when he returned, and limited him to below his normal performance. He's healthy entering this season and Fantasy owners know what a healthy and effective Perkins is capable of. Perkins will never be a top offensive option in Fantasy play, but he does the intangibles and is a worthy Fantasy center. Consider him just outside the top 25 center options and take him with a mid-to-late-round pick on Draft Day.

### **Tiago Splitter, C, SA**

In six starts last season, Tiago Splitter showed some promise by averaging 8.7 points and 7.0 rebounds per game. However, his chances to make any significant impact this season remain limited outside of extended absences from either Tim Duncan or DeJuan Blair. Splitter will not be worth drafting in most Fantasy formats, but will be a player worth tracking in deeper formats. Given 30-35 minutes per game, he is capable of producing around 10 points and 10 boards per game.

### **Kurt Thomas, C, POR**

Thomas had a resurgent year, of sorts, in his first season in Chicago in 2010-11. He wasn't expected to play much but with Carlos Boozer and Joakim Noah going down with injuries at different times, he became a valuable big-man off the bench for the Bulls. He played in 52 games, averaging 4.1 points with 5.8 rebounds and 0.8 blocks. The veteran proved that he could still play some solid defense and even shot 51.1 percent from the field, matching his career high. But with Omer Asik expected to become a larger part of the system in 2011-12, it looks as though the 38-year-old could see himself on the bench more often this season. Thomas hasn't been a reliable Fantasy option for years now and would only be worth using in deeper category-based formats if he sees playing time. Plan on ignoring him in all formats on Draft Day.

## **Forwards**

### **LaMarcus Aldridge, PF, POR**

LaMarcus Aldridge finally had the breakout season everyone was waiting for during the 2010-11 campaign. The 26-year-old put up career-highs across the board, including points (21.8), rebounds (8.8), free-throw percentage (79.1) and minutes (39.6). He also posted 36 double-doubles and finished in the top 10, in terms of Fantasy points, among all Fantasy forwards last season. However, many feel he hasn't reached his ceiling yet, especially offensively, although the additions of Gerald Wallace and Raymond Felton should help take away some of the double teams he consistently had to deal with last year. At the very least, owners know what they can expect from Aldridge at this point in his career. He is going to provide nightly scoring totals in the high-teens to go along with around 8-10 rebounds and a few dimes. Aldridge has also averaged a steal and block per game last season, which is going to really help out those in category-based formats. The fact that he will also have dual eligibility at center doesn't hurt either. While the Blazers finally added some healthy pieces to help take some of the burden off him, Aldridge can once again be considered a No. 1 Fantasy option, worthy of an early round selection on Draft Day.

### **Ryan Anderson, PF, ORL**

Anderson had his best offensive season of his young career with the Magic during the 2011-12 campaign. The 23-year-old averaged a career-best 10.6 points and 5.5 rebounds while appearing in 64 games on the season. He saw some decent time when Brandon Bass went down with an injury and was once again a deep threat, posting a 39 percent shooting percentage from behind the arc. However, the Magic want him to tweak his game a bit in the offseason. Anderson is working on improving his post-up game as well as creating more off-the-dribble effectiveness so defenders can't crowd him so much at the three-point line. He should once again continue to push Brandon Bass for more minutes and could be in line for a major boost in production during his fourth season. Fantasy owners should consider Anderson as a solid reserve worthy of taking flier in deeper head-to-head formats. Although, he could be worth spending a late-round pick on in category-based formats because of his 3-point shooting.

### **Carmelo Anthony, SF, NY**

The sky is the limit for Anthony's first full season at Madison Square Garden. The Knicks faithful will adore him and coach Mike D'Antoni will design an offense around him. Anthony is one of the NBA's premier talents and he averaged 26.3 points, 6.7 rebounds and 3.0 assists per game while shooting 46 percent from the field and 42 percent from 3-point range over 27 games with the Knicks after coming over from Denver. Imagine what he'll be able to do with D'Antoni having an entire offseason to design the offense specifically tailored for Anthony's strengths and weaknesses. The Knicks will continue to have an up-tempo offense and Anthony will have to share the scoring load with Amar'e Stoudemire. Still, the dynamic duo didn't have much trouble doing that at the end of last year and the two want to win more than they want their name in the spotlight. In New York, it will be there already. Anthony has averaged 25 points and over six boards for his career, and could be verging on his best season in the NBA yet with the Knicks. He's easily a top five Fantasy forward and a player to target in the first round of all Fantasy drafts. He revealed in late September that he underwent surgery on his knee and elbow to address lingering pain that he says has bothered him for the past seven years. Able to play in barnstorming games throughout the lockout following the procedures, he should be more than a safe pick in drafts.

### **Ron Artest, SF, LAL**

After watching his numbers take a huge hit during his first year in Los Angeles, many felt Ron Artest would be able to bounce back heading into 2010-11. However, that was not the case, as Artest struggled in his second year in L.A. He posted career-lows in points (8.5), rebounds (3.3) and field-goal percentage (39.7). Artest almost looked confused about his offensive role at times last year, but will now be reunited with Mike Brown, who was a former assistant for the Pacers when he played there. Brown has already claimed he will ditch the triangle offense and focus more on working everything through 7-footers Andrew Bynum and Pau Gasol. That should mean more touches for Artest as the ball should move around a bit more and not sit in Kobe Bryant's hands at all times. While some think Artest is set for a bounce-back 2011-12 campaign, he should only be drafted in the later rounds of deeper formats until he proves he can once again become a productive Fantasy option.

### **Darrell Arthur, PF, MEM**

Darrell Arthur averaged a career-high 9.1 points per game last season, playing around 20 minutes off the bench. While he could enjoy a modest increase to those numbers this season, Arthur will remain unusable in most Fantasy formats as long as both Zach Randolph and Marc Gasol remain healthy. He has the ceiling of a potential 15-and-7 player given the opportunity to play 35 minutes per game, but we do not anticipate that happening in 2011-12. Invest no more than a flier pick on him in the late rounds of deep leagues.

### **Brandon Bass, PF, BOS**

After turning in his most productive season in the NBA, F Brandon Bass could improve on those numbers this year with Boston. Bass, who was dealt to the Celtics from Orlando in exchange for F Glen Davis, finished with career highs in points (11.2) and rebounds (5.6) last season. The 26-year-old logged nearly 2,000 minutes with the Magic last season while earning 51 starts. He will start on the bench again this year but with the injury risk carried by F Kevin Garnett and C Jermaine O'Neal, Bass has another opportunity to receive several starts. He recorded three double-doubles last season and that total could increase with his pairing of assist artist Rajon Rondo. Consider Bass a solid Fantasy reserve with modest sleeper appeal worthy of spending a late-round pick on in most head-to-head formats.

### **Shane Battier, SF, MIA**

If you are in a standard Head-to-Head format, expect Shane Battier to be on and off the waiver wire for much of the season. In category leagues, though, Battier will make for a worthwhile reserve to keep around for use throughout the season. A jack-of-all-trades, but master of none, he is capable of filling up a box score without excelling in any particular category. He has averaged a 9-5-3-1-1 stat line throughout his NBA career, though his numbers did experience a bit of a decline after being traded to the Grizzlies for the final 23 games of the regular season. A role player both in real life and in Fantasy hoops, he will be worth little more than a pick in the final round or two of most leagues.

### **Michael Beasley, PF, MIN**

Michael Beasley enjoyed his change of scenery in 2010-11. After being under the shadow of Dwyane Wade in his first two years with the Heat, he moved to the Timberwolves and enjoyed the best offensive campaign of his young career. He averaged 19.2 points with 5.6 rebounds and 2.2 assists while playing in 73 games. He also incorporated the 3-pointer more into his game, shooting 36.6 percent from beyond the arc and making a career-high 60. He still shot well from the field (45 percent) and even chipped in with 0.7 blocks. While his rebounding dropped off a bit that can be expected playing alongside Kevin Love. The 22-year-old experienced some offseason troubles, again, as he was ticketed for marijuana possession in July, but he is expected to be ready to go for the 2011-2012 campaign. But with Minnesota drafting Derrick Williams with the No. 2 overall pick in the NBA Draft, Beasley could be out of a starting job. There is no denying his talent but with the uncertainty of his role with the T-Wolves, consider Beasley as a No. 3 Fantasy forward on Draft Day.

### **Andray Blatche, PF, WAS**

The 2010-11 season was a bit of a roller coaster ride for Andray Blatche. He broke his foot just weeks into training camp and then struggled to get back on the floor because of conditioning issues. He was also involved in a few incidents off the court, including a fight with teammate JaVale McGee outside a nightclub in Washington D.C., which resulted in a one-game suspension. However, in spite of all of the distractions, Blatche was once again able to increase his scoring and rebounding production for the fifth consecutive season. He finished the 2010-11 campaign averaging career highs in points (16.8), rebounds (8.2) and minutes (34.0) and was the 33rd highest scoring forward in terms of Fantasy points in all CBSsports.com standard formats. Still, injuries took a huge toll on the 24-year-old, limiting Blatche to just 64 games because of hip, knee, shoulder and foot issues. He vowed to work on his strength and flexibility over the offseason in order to hopefully avoid some of those injuries moving forward and could develop into an elite Fantasy option if he could manage to stay healthy and out of trouble. However, because he has yet to prove that, Fantasy owners should once again consider Blatche worthy of a mid-round selection on Draft Day.

### **Carlos Boozer, PF, CHI**

Carlos Boozer was limited to just 59 games a year ago and saw his numbers take a bit of a dip in his first season with the Bulls. After averaging more than 18 points and 10 rebounds in his six seasons in Utah, he posted 17.5 points with 9.6 rebounds in 2010-11. He also shot 51 percent from the field and averaged less than one steal per contest for the first time since 2006-07. But the 30-year-old was productive when healthy and is expected to be the low-post scoring threat Chicago has been missing for years. Keep in mind that he can struggle against some of the bigger power forwards in the league but in the Bulls offense, his mid-range jumpshot will pay huge dividends when league MVP Derrick Rose drives to the lane and kicks out to him. He is not expected to outscore Rose or rebounder Joakim Noah, but Boozer should be able to average around 18 points and 10 rebounds per game as long as he is healthy. Health issues have been a problem for him throughout his career, but Boozer remains a productive enough option to be considered as a low-end No. 2/high-end No. 3 Fantasy F on Draft Day.

### **Chris Bosh, PF, MIA**

Chris Bosh's production took the biggest hit of the Big Three during his first season in Miami. Bosh seemed very unsure of his role over the first few months of the season, acting almost passive and even lost at times on the floor. The 27-year-old's production decreased in almost every single offensive category last season, including field goals made, attempts and percentage. However, Bosh still averaged a respectable 18.7 points and 8.3 rebounds and finished as the 16th highest scoring forward, in terms of Fantasy points in all Head-to-Head formats least season. His status as a high-end No.1 forward might have been tarnished but many are expecting somewhat of a bounce-back season from the six-time All-Star. Bosh really seemed to find his niche in Miami's offense over the final two months in the season, averaging a combined 19.6 points and 8.8 rebounds over March and April. He told Pat Riley that he wants to bulk up some over the summer in order to get stronger near the basket as the Heat want Bosh to establish himself as more of a scoring threat in the post. While his days of averaging 20 and 10 might be over, 18 and 8 is still better than most options out there, which is why Fantasy owners shouldn't hesitate to spend an early-to-middle round pick on Bosh on Draft Day next season.

### **Elton Brand, PF, PHI**

While Brand certainly isn't getting any younger, he can finally say he's entering the 2011-12 season completely healthy for the first time since 2006-07. The 32-year-old played in and started 81 games last year, his most since 2004-05, and averaged 15 points, 8.3 rebounds and 1.3 blocks per night. Brand is never going to score as he did with the Clippers, but he's expected to do big things for the Sixers this season after recording 24 double-doubles. Brand is not a 20-and-10 player, but Fantasy owners can finally begin targeting him early in drafts once again. We know owners will still be skeptical after getting burned in previous years, but Brand is healthy and isn't to the point in his career where his skills are in decline. Coach Doug Collins will need him to anchor the offense down low and Jrue Holiday should be able to get him the ball enough for him to be a solid No. 2 or 3 Fantasy forward. Consider him beginning in the middle rounds of all Fantasy drafts.

### **Caron Butler, SF, LAC**

After injuries derailed his production the past few seasons, veteran F Caron Butler earns another fresh start in 2011-12. Butler signed with the new-look Clippers and will start opposite F Blake Griffin on the block this year. Butler missed Dallas' championship run last year due to a ruptured right patellar tendon, but he insists he is healthy heading into the upcoming season. He is no longer the Fantasy standout he was previously with Washington and has played in more than 60 games only once since 2006-07. Butler remains a solid source for steals and carries a career field-goal percentage of .441. While Fantasy owners should be wary of a player coming off a major knee injury, Butler could make for a value pick starting in the eighth round of most drafts.

### **Marcus Camby, PF/C, POR**

Marcus Camby was banged up more than usual during his first season with the Trail Blazers and was limited to 59 games -- his lowest mark since 2005-06 -- due to knee problems. When he was on the court, he averaged 4.7 points with 10.3 rebounds and 1.6 blocks while seeing about 26 minutes a game. His 39.8 shooting percentage was the lowest of his career, as were most of his other offensive stats. His scoring was over six points off of his career mark but the 37-year-old was still able to chip in with some solid blocks and rebounding numbers while playing alongside LaMarcus Aldridge. The former Minute Man has never been a huge scoring threat and luckily he will not be counted on for much in 2011-12. Fantasy owners can expect his usual rebounds and defensive stats, as long as his body can hold up, but given his limited offense, consider Camby as a Fantasy center best left for category-based formats on Draft Day.

### **Norris Cole, F/PG, MIA**

With the Heat looking for help at point guard, Norris Cole could see significant playing time as a rookie. Mario Chalmers is currently the only other point guard on Miami's roster, which is why Miami targeted the 6-foot-2 guard out of Cleveland State. He averaged a 22-6-5 stat line during his senior season but will be asked to be more of a distributor playing alongside LeBron James, Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh. While the potential for him to produce is there, Norris can still likely go undrafted in the majority of formats heading into next season. However, owners are advised to monitor how he fares along the way. If he starts seeing decent minutes, Norris could prove to be a very solid pickup off the waiver wire. In the meantime, Cole should only be drafted with a late-round pick in dynasty/keeper leagues and rookie-only formats.

### **Ed Davis, PF, TOR**

Davis really showed what he can do as a rookie last season as he came on late in the year to provide a nice spark to the entire Raptors team. The UNC product saw his minutes improve with each passing month in his first season in the NBA and finished strong by averaging 12.9 points, 9.0 rebound and a block and steal per game over eight April contests. The sky is the limit for the second-year player, though he'll have to deal with limited playing time beside Joey Dorsey, Reggie Evans, Amir Johnson, Julian Wright, Sonny Weems, James Johnson and Linas Kleiza. Davis might have the biggest upside of that bunch, however, so Fantasy owners should consider him with plenty of sleeper value. Davis might be worthy of a late-round Fantasy flier pick on Draft Day.

### [Glen Davis, PF, ORL](#)

Following four years of serving as a key reserve in Boston, F Glen Davis will have an opportunity to start this season with his new team, the Magic. After posting a career-high 11.7 points and 5.5 rebounds per game last season, Davis was shipped to Orlando in exchange for F Brandon Bass just prior to training camp. And he could improve on that scoring mark this season. With most opponents double-teaming star C Dwight Howard, Davis could receive several looks close to the basket and providing him an opportunity to see increased production. The 25-year-old has connected on at least 43.7 percent of his attempts from the field in every season during his career. Davis has already seen his stock improve and he should be targeted in the middle rounds of most 2011-12 Fantasy drafts -- just don't let him slip too far.

### [Carlos Delfino, SF, MIL](#)

There are many unknowns surrounding Carlos Delfino coming into the 2011-12 season. The Argentine forward missed nearly the entire first two months of the year after suffering a concussion during the first week of the 2010-11 campaign, but played well upon returning. Despite being limited to just 49 games (40 starts), Delfino averaged a career-best 11.5 points to go along with 4.1 rebounds and 1.6 steals per contest while averaging around 32.5 minutes. He also put up back-to-back 30-point games in March and led the club with 105 three-pointers made while shooting 37 percent from downtown. After a strong finish to the season, the Bucks picked up his player option back in April and Delfino was expected to once again be a starting forward heading into the new season. However, that might not be the case now as Milwaukee shook up its roster by landing Stephen Jackson and Beno Udrih in a pair of Draft Day trades back in June. Jackson will most likely now assume the starting-small forward role, which leaves Delfino's role a bit uncertain heading into training camp. If he does in fact find himself coming off the bench, owners should be prepared to see a decrease in stats. He will likely see around 20 minutes per game coming off the pine, and based on how he fared with the Raptors in a reserve role, owners are probably looking at around 10 points and a handful of rebounds a night. With the way things look right now, Delfino is not worth drafting in most formats.

### [Luol Deng, SF, CHI](#)

Luol Deng became a more well-rounded player last season and proved to be a solid No. 2 scorer behind Derrick Rose while helping lead the Bulls to the Eastern Conference Finals. While his rebounds fell off a bit, he still averaged more than 17 points per contest and became a serious threat from behind the arc. He shot 34.5 percent from the 3-point line, making 115. He made just 101 in his first six seasons in the NBA. He also proved to be healthy for the first time in years, playing in all 82 regular season games in 2010-11. His jump-shooting ability fits well with Rose's prowess for driving to the lane and kicking it out so Fantasy owners should expect more of the same from the 26-year-old in 2011-12. He could easily post close to 18 points with anywhere from 5-8 rebounds per game while shooting for a respectable average from the field. Don't underestimate his ability to chip in with a few steals and blocks as well. Deng can fill up the stat sheet on a nightly basis and will be counted on to do most of the scoring when Rose is on the bench so consider him a No. 2 Fantasy F on Draft Day.

### [Boris Diaw, SF, CHA](#)

Diaw's numbers during his second season in Charlotte were eerily similar to his first. The 29-year-old once again averaged 11.3 points per contest to go along with five assists and four steals while appearing in and starting all 82 games. While Diaw's lack of scoring was once again the source of some frustration for Fantasy owners, Diaw's peripheral stats kept him a viable option throughout the season, especially in Rotisserie and category-based formats. However, Paul Silas told Diaw he wants him to be assertive on the offensive end of the floor next season and take more shots. Combine that with the departure of Stephen Jackson, and Diaw could finally get his scoring back into the mid-teens. Still, this isn't the first time we have heard this about Diaw, who has always been critiqued for being too passive. Either way, Diaw's ability to fill up a box score on a nightly basis makes him worthy of a mid-to-late round pick in standard formats on Draft Day. Owners in Rotisserie formats should take him a little higher.

### [Jared Dudley, SF/SG, PHO](#)

Jared Dudley finally got his chance to shine late last season and may have earned himself his first chance to be looked upon as a primary option in the NBA. When Vince Carter was acquired from the Magic in exchange for Jason Richardson and fell victim to his aching knees, limiting him for much of the final two months of the season, Dudley was able to step into a more prominent role and took full advantage. He averaged 16.3 points, 5.9 rebounds, 2.2 assists and, most impressively, 2.1 steals over 15 starts. He got 34.1 minutes per game in those starts, and while he may not get that many minutes over the course of a full season, he could come close. Consider Dudley a potential late-round sleeper who could be in for a breakout season if he can follow up on his late-season performance. In category leagues, he could emerge as a premium source for 3-point shooting if he is given heavy minutes throughout the season.

### [Tim Duncan, PF, SA](#)

For several years, Tim Duncan was one of the ticking time bombs of Fantasy hoops. That bomb went off last season, leaving many of his Fantasy owners in a bad spot. However, a proper adjustment in expectations should still allow owners to view Duncan as a viable choice among second-tier forward options. He averaged numbers well below his career lows in scoring (13.4 ppg) and rebounds (8.9 rpg) last season as his playing time dipped below 30 minutes per game for the first time in his 14-year NBA career. Fantasy owners should expect him to continue to sit out the back end of back-to-back sets and further limitations are likely for the 35-year-old as the Spurs look to keep him healthy for as long as possible. He remains capable of about 14 points and nine boards per game along with quality production in blocks. That makes this version of Duncan still worthy of a pick within the first six rounds.

### [Kevin Durant, SF, OKC](#)

One of the NBA's most exciting young players, the 23-year-old Durant did not live up to lofty expectations last year. That said, Fantasy owners who took him among the first three picks still got a top Fantasy option with his 27.7 points, 6.8 rebounds, 2.7 assists, 1.1 steals, one block and almost two 3-pointers per game. While most of those numbers came in below what he put up in 2009-10 as a 21-year-old, Durant also had to learn to share with Russell Westbrook, who blossomed last season. Durant should become a little more take-charge this year as he and Westbrook figure out how to co-exist and get the best out of their distinctive abilities. There is no doubt that Durant will once again be among the game's and Fantasy's best. Owners should still have lofty expectations and consider taking him with one of the first few selections on Draft Day.

### [Landry Fields, SF/SG, NY](#)

The 23-year-old Fields played in all 82 games as a rookie last season and started in 81 of those contests. He was perhaps the most pleasant surprise of the entire rookie class as he averaged 9.7 points, 6.4 rebounds, 1.9 assists and a steal per game while shooting 40 percent from 3-point range and 50 percent from the field. Unfortunately, Fields' production really took a hit once Chauncey Billups and Carmelo Anthony came over from Denver. Fields' scoring dropped by a full point after the All-Star break and his rebounding dropped by over two boards per game. A year older, Fields will certainly be a major contributor alongside Billups in the backcourt, and coach Mike D'Antoni could ask him to score even more in his high-tempo offense. That being said, expectations must be curbed because the Knicks have so much firepower. The Stanford product will certainly be a viable Fantasy weapon in his sophomore season, but is someone to target late on Draft Day as a guard sitting right outside the top 60.

### [Danilo Gallinari, SF, DEN](#)

Gallinari averaged 15.9 points per game last year over 48 contests with the Knicks. After coming over to Denver, Gallinari put up 14.7 points per game in a lower-scoring offense. With Denver coach George Karl having so much confidence in the 23-year-old, Fantasy owners might be able to expect him to fall between the two scoring averages as he figures to play a prominent role in the offense in 2011-12. Gallinari shot 37 percent from 3-point range after coming over to Denver and he averaged around a 3-pointer and a half per game last year. He started grabbing more rebounds with Denver and averaged 5.4 per night over his final 14 games of the season. Karl has already said that he expects Gallinari to see an increased responsibility in the rotation and that can only compute to an improvement in the young Italian's game. Gallinari will help your Fantasy team in scoring, rebounding and shooting and is well-worth drafting beginning in the middle rounds on Draft Day. The potential starter in all Fantasy formats should be considered a sleeper with pretty large upside. He's already just inside the top 50 Fantasy forwards to target heading into the season.

### **Kevin Garnett, PF, BOS**

Garnett has some semblance of uncertainty surrounding him entering the season as he's now 35 years old and who knows how long he and aging teammates Paul Pierce and Ray Allen can keep up their waning talents. That being said, Garnett actually showed improvement last year as he averaged 14.9 points, 8.9 rebounds and 2.4 assists and is playing for a possible new contract this season. Historically one of the most complete power forwards in the game, Garnett has become a little more one-dimensional for Fantasy owners in terms of boards and scoring. His role within the Boston offense will stay mostly the same and Garnett will continue to threaten nightly double-doubles, but he's no longer a No. 1 Fantasy option. The good news is Garnett has remained largely durable as he played 71 games last year for the Celtics. He's going to start and play around 30 minutes per game, shooting around 50 percent from the field. Ranked just outside the top 25 Fantasy forwards entering the year, Garnett is still a solid mid-round Fantasy option on Draft Day.

### **Pau Gasol, PF, LAL**

Pau Gasol is coming off another stellar season in Los Angeles, which saw him once again average a double-double (18.8 points 10.2 rebounds). He also chipped in with 3.3 assists per game and 1.5 blocks while shooting an impressive 53 percent from the field and a career-high 82.3 percent from the free-throw line. However, there are big changes expected in Los Angeles this season, as Phil Jackson and the triangle offense are officially retired and Mike Brown is in. While Brown made it perfectly clear that this is still Kobe Bryant's team, he is expected to try and run the offense more through Gasol and fellow 7-footer Andrew Bynum. That could actually mean even more touches for the Spaniard, who averaged 13.3 shot attempts a season ago. It could realistically take a few weeks for the Lakers to begin clicking since they are installing a new offense, although we don't expect Gasol's numbers to be affected by this. He has proved to be one of the most productive big men in the league over the past few seasons and the fact that is he also dual-eligible at forward, only adds to his value. Fantasy owners should consider the 31-year-old a No. 1 Fantasy center on Draft Day.

### **Rudy Gay, SF, MEM**

Rudy Gay missed the team's playoff run last season due to a separated shoulder. The injury is expected to be fully healed in time for him to be 100 percent for the 2011-12 season and that will once again make him worthy of a pick somewhere around the fifth round of most standard formats. Capable of scoring near 20 points per contest, he should also contribute around six boards and nearly two steals per game. Last season, he upped his assist average to 2.8 per game and also averaged a career-best 1.1 blocks per tilt. Count on him for at least a 3-pointer made per game as well.

### **Taj Gibson, PF, CHI**

Gibson was not expected to do much entering the 2010-11 campaign but with key injuries to Carlos Boozer and Joakim Noah, he was able to put up some stats for Fantasy owners. He appeared in 80 games, averaging 7.1 points with 5.7 rebounds while playing more than 20 minutes per contest. While his stats fell off from his rookie season, the 26-year-old increased his free throw shooting and was still a defensive presence. Under head coach Tom Thibodeau, he should continue to see minutes off the bench for his versatility as a defender. He still has a ton of upside as an all-around player but he might not be able to reach that potential as long as he is stuck behind Boozer. He will also need to fill out a little more to become a true power forward but his athleticism and ability to rebound should keep him relevant in Fantasy. Consider Gibson as more of a low-end Fantasy F on Draft Day, more suited for Rotisserie formats.

### **Drew Gooden, PF, MIL**

Gooden's first season in Milwaukee was certainly a frustrating one as injuries limited him to a career-low 34 games last year. The veteran played 15 of his 35 games during October and November before pretty much sitting out the next three months as he battled with plantar fasciitis in his left foot. However, was able to get back on the court in April and finished strong, averaging a season-high 12.9 points during the final month of the season. He also recorded his first career triple-double with 15 points, 13 assists and 13 boards back on April 9. Gooden has the ability to post close to a double-double per outing, but his left foot issues severely hampered his production. He is normally fairly durable – averaging 72 games per season prior to 2011-12 – so could be in line for a nice bounce-back season if he is able to stay on the court. He is once again expected to be the starting power forward entering training camp and may even see a few minutes at center every now and again. While there are still some questions surrounding his troublesome left foot, Gooden's ability to score and rebound make him a solid low-end Fantasy forward in most formats. Target him in the later rounds on Draft Day.

### **Danny Granger, SF, IND**

Indiana F Danny Granger was a bit of a disappointment from a Fantasy standpoint during the 2010-11 campaign. Granger's scoring was down nearly 3.5 points from the previous season as he finished with an average of 20.5 ppg -- his lowest output since 2007. Part of the reason for that is the Pacers are trying to become more balanced offensively. In years past, Granger had been forced to carry the team on his back, however, Indiana had five players average in double-digits last season. This year, the Pacers signed F David West, who could certainly eat into Granger's production. Despite his scoring dip, Granger was still able to fill up the box score on a nightly basis, as he averaged more than five rebounds and two assists for the fourth straight season. While Granger might not be able to get his scoring back into the mid-20s, his production still ranks among the higher-end forward options, especially in category-based formats. As long as owners can deal with his high turnover rate, Granger is worth an early-round selection in all formats on Draft Day.

### **Jeff Green, PF, BOS**

Boston F Jeff Green will have surgery to repair an aortic aneurysm and will miss the entire 2011-12 season. While obviously Green and the Celtics were disappointed to learn of the news, the timing of his of his training camp physical -- and the end of the NBA lockout -- may have saved his life. The 25-year-old is expected to make a full recovery and resume his playing career next season. Fantasy owners should keep an eye on his recovery over the next several months. A healthy Green would likely be worth drafting with a late-round pick in 2012-13.

### **Blake Griffin, PF, LAC**

Blake Griffin was able to make up for lost time in 2010-11 after missing what was supposed to be his rookie season due to a broken left kneecap. He played and started all 82 games for the Clippers, instantly stepping into a role as a franchise player by averaging 22.5 points, 12.1 rebounds and 3.8 assists. In standard Head-to-Head leagues, he finished fourth overall in Fantasy points behind only LeBron James, Derrick Rose and Russell Westbrook and will head into the 2011-12 season as a player who may go in the first-round in those formats. In Rotisserie leagues, however, his value was significantly less as a result of the damage he can cause in free-throw percentage while being dead weight in 3-point shooting and offering very little in the blocks department. So while he may be off the board in the first round in Head-to-Head, he may be selected as late as Round Four or Five in category play. Fantasy owners should also take into account a possible decline in rebounds this season if Chris Kaman proves healthy and productive again. Griffin's future is that of a Fantasy superstar for years to come, but there is some danger of overvaluing him after his outstanding rookie campaign.

### **Tyler Hansbrough, PF, IND**

Indiana F Tyler Hansbrough had a breakout campaign last year, averaging 11 points and 5.2 rebounds during his second season in the league. However, he really didn't come on until the second half of the season as he benefited the most from the Pacers' mid-season coaching change. Hansbrough saw his playing time increase nearly 10 minutes under Frank Vogel and responded by averaging 15.3 points and 6.7 rebounds following the All-Star break. He seemed poised to improve on those numbers this year, but the Pacers signed David West to play power forward. Hansbrough will likely return to the bench, but he could see some start as West returns from a torn ACL. Hansbrough developed into a quality low-end Fantasy forward, who still has upside. Consider him worthy of a late-round pick in deeper drafts for 2011-12.

### **Al Harrington, PF, DEN**

Harrington is incredibly entering his 14th NBA season at the ripe old age of 30. That said, he's coming off one of the least productive seasons of his career. Keeping in mind he did deal with plantar fasciitis for much of his 73 games played, Harrington mustered just 10.5 points, 4.5 rebounds and 1.4 steals per game last year while shooting just under 42 percent from the field. He only topped 20 points seven times on the entire season and there is no reason to believe things will be different in 2011-12. He's pretty stuck in the rotation for George Karl, especially after the team added depth after trading away Carmelo Anthony and Chauncey Billups. The Nuggets have plenty of pieces who can contribute if Harrington continues to struggle, and we don't expect much more than the 22.8 minutes per game he got last year. His numbers got even uglier as the season progressed and we feel compelled to rank him outside the top 60 Fantasy forwards entering this season. He's a late-round draft pick on Draft Day until he proves otherwise.

### **Udonis Haslem, PF, MIA**

Udonis Haslem's 2010-11 campaign lasted just 13 games because of a foot injury he suffered back in November. However, he did offer Fantasy owners a small glimpse of what to expect playing alongside the likes of LeBron James, Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh. Haslem, who has been accustomed to starting over his career, was used off the bench last season and averaged 8.0 points and 8.2 rebounds while seeing 26.5 minutes per contest. No real surprise there, as Fantasy owners should be used to Haslem's relatively unchanged production over the past few seasons. Even if he finds himself in a starting role next year, Haslem will be good for around 10 points per game with around 8-9 boards and will likely see around 25-30 minutes per night. He will once again be counted on to be the team's workhorse on the glass and may even get a shot at center from time-to-time. Haslem is expected to be fully recovered from his foot injury and can be considered a quality low-end reserve option to be used as needed throughout the season. Consider the 31-year-old worthy of a late-round pick in most formats on Draft Day.

### **J.J. Hickson, PF, SAC**

In a surprise draft day move, J.J. Hickson was traded from Cleveland to Sacramento. He leaves a Cleveland team desperate for go-to options in the midst of the post-LeBron era to enter one of the more crowded frontcourt situations in the NBA. In Sacramento, he'll be part of a rotation that includes DeMarcus Cousins and Jason Thompson, though we anticipate Hickson should get a majority of the playing time alongside Cousins. With a back court that features capable scorers like Tyreke Evans, Marcus Thornton and even rookie Jimmer Fredette, there may not be enough offensive touches to go around for Hickson to match the 13.8 points per game he averaged with Cleveland last season. He might also find it hard to match the 8.7 rebounds per game he averaged for the Cavs, but remains a promising young forward in a much more wide-open system than the one he played in with Cleveland. He'll be a safe pick beginning in Round 10 in standard formats.

### **Grant Hill, SF, PHO**

After several injury-plagued seasons, Grant Hill has proven to be one of the more reliable players in the NBA over the past three seasons. He has played at least 80 games in each of those campaigns and has remained more than just a token role player into his late 30s. The 38-year-old should still see about 30 minutes and 10 shots per game on most nights and can chip in scoring in the low teens to go with about four rebounds and three dimes per game. He won't be a player Fantasy owners will want to rely on a week-to-week basis, but the former NBA superstar still has enough left in the tank to be a very useful reserve to keep around and use as needed. He is well worth a late-round pick in any Fantasy format.

### **Kris Humphries, PF, NJ**

Humphries is only 26, but he's already playing in his eighth NBA season with his fourth NBA team as he enters 2011-12 with the Nets. Humphries played a career-high 74 games last year and started in 44 of them as he erupted onto the Fantasy scene under coach Avery Johnson. He became a go-to player for New Jersey last year as he averaged 10 points and 10 boards per game with 1.1 blocks and 53 percent shooting from the field over 28 minutes. Humphries was such a good rebounder, he limited Brook Lopez's boards and rendered the center just a scorer as he did the dirty work down low. Fantasy owners can expect more of the same from Humphries, who has been lauded by his coach and Nets GM Billy King. Humphries is one of those players who was a sleeper last year but could be a slight bust this season if he suffers a letdown. He should certainly be targeted beginning in the middle rounds of Fantasy drafts. We believe he fits inside the top 30 Fantasy forwards in the league.

### **Serge Ibaka, PF, OKC**

It is no secret that the Thunder are a young, exciting bunch of talented players. While most of the NBA has already been put on notice of what Russell Westbrook and Kevin Durant can do, Ibaka has only begun to burst onto the scene. The 22-year-old, African, 6-foot-10 forward started 44 games for the Thunder last year and appeared in all 82, showcasing his durability as a young up-and-coming star. Ibaka was a solid defensive presence as he averaged 7.6 rebounds and 2.4 blocks per game over 27 minutes per night. He also has shot 54 percent from the field in back-to-back seasons. Ibaka should continue improving his offensive ability after scoring almost 10 points per game a year ago. In fact, Ibaka put up 10.8 points, 8.8 rebounds and 3.0 blocks per game over his final 28 regular-season contests last year and could be around double-double numbers all year. We expect Ibaka to continue breaking out with all the talent surrounding him in Oklahoma City. Fantasy owners can consider him an easy top 50 Fantasy forward and someone to target beginning in the middle rounds.

### **Andre Iguodala, SF, PHI**

There is no doubt that Iguodala is looking to bounce back after one of the more frustrating years in his NBA career. The 27-year-old is coming off a season in which he was plagued by a multitude of injuries – including a sprained wrist, sore Achilles' and knee tendinitis – as he played a career-low 67 games. His 14.1 points per game was his lowest scoring average since his second year in the league and his rebounding was down as well. A healthy Elton Brand actually helped his assist-to-turnover ratio, however, and Iguodala was every bit as dangerous on defense. His health will be the biggest question mark, followed by how he continues to gel alongside Jrue Holiday with Brand down low. This is still A.I.'s team, however, and you can bet coach Doug Collins wants him back closer to his 2009-10 season when he put up 17.1 points, 6.5 rebounds, 5.8 assists and nailed over a 3-pointer per game over a full 82-game schedule. Iguodala has always been a Rotisserie owner's dream as he's one of the most complete players in Fantasy. Owners might be a little down on him entering the year, but he should be taken in the earlier rounds on Draft Day as a top 20 Fantasy forward, who also happens to have guard eligibility.

### **LeBron James, SF, MIA**

After a whirlwind first season with the Heat for LeBron James, Fantasy owners can go into the 2011-12 season much more confident in him than they did last fall. A fear of the unknown temporarily knocked King James off his perch as the consensus No. 1 overall choice in Fantasy going into his first season on South Beach. After all, it would be LeBron's first season having to share the limelight (and the ball) with the likes of stars like Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh. But LeBron went on to address those concerns and proved that he remains the cream of the crop in Fantasy hoops. We now know, as anticipated, that there will indeed be a drop in scoring as part of joining up with Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh in Miami, but the fall in scoring was not as dramatic as feared (29.7 ppg in 2009-10 to 26.7 ppg in 2010-11) and there still remains a considerable gap between him and the next tier of elite players. That gap closed some last season, but it remained as he averaged seven assists and seven rebounds for the fourth consecutive year and maintained practically the same level of production across the stat line that he has enjoyed throughout his career. The result was LeBron outscoring all others in Head-to-Head points for a fourth consecutive season. We suspect he will make it five consecutive years this season and fully endorse him as the top overall pick in Fantasy hoops, regardless of format.

### **Antawn Jamison, PF, CLE**

Antawn Jamison missed the final 26 games of the regular season last year after fracturing his left little finger. However, the veteran managed to finish as one of the top-50 Fantasy forwards in standard CBSSports.com leagues, averaging 18.0 points, 6.7 rebounds and 1.7 assists per outing. When you also take into consideration the fact that he only started in 38 of the 56 games he appeared in, it shows you just how impressive the veteran can be. While there are a ton questions surrounding the current make-up of the Cavs' roster, Jamison appears to be a big part of the team's rebuilding process. He will most likely find himself back in the starting lineup -- at least in the beginning of the season -- which should allow him to see his scoring stay right around 20 points per night. Owners should also get around 6-7 rebounds with a few assists and steals sprinkled in, which will help in category-based formats. The one red flag is his recent injury history. He has missed a combined 42 games the past two seasons, and will be 35-year-old at the start of the 2011-12 season. While he is no longer the high-end option he was back in his days with Golden State and Washington, Jamison can still be productive enough for a late-round pick in most formats on Draft Day.

### **Al Jefferson, C/PF, UTA**

Al Jefferson put together a solid 2010-11 campaign during his first season in Utah, averaging 18.6 points, 9.7 rebounds and a career-best 1.9 blocks per contest. He also logged 37-double-doubles and played in all 82 games for just the second time in his career. The original plan was for the 26-year-old to play some center and forward for the Jazz, but injuries and the strong play of Paul Millsap forced him to spend the most of the season playing the five. He will have some competition though, as the club drafted Enes Kanter with the No. 3 overall pick in this summer's draft. Still, the team wants him to play more power forward this season and is reportedly considering moving Millsap in the middle. No matter what position he plays, Jefferson can be counted on to put up close to a double-double every night, to go along with a handful of assists and a block. He finished as the third highest-scoring center, in terms of Fantasy points, in all CBSSports.com standard formats and is certainly worth selecting in the early rounds on Draft Day.

### **Richard Jefferson, SF, SA**

Since joining the Spurs prior to the 2009-10 season, Richard Jefferson has gone from a prominent Fantasy contributor to a fringe bench option in most formats. His offensive touches have dipped significantly and he finished the 2010-11 season averaging just 7.9 shot attempts per game. That total was second lowest only to his rookie year with the Nets in 2001-02. Barring a rash of injuries to Tim Duncan, Tony Parker and Manu Ginobili, do not expect a significant increase in touches or Fantasy value. Just a couple of years removed from a 20-5-4 stat line in his last season with the Bucks, he is a worthwhile reserve option or handcuff measure for owners of any of the team's more prominent trio. However, he'll be worth little more than a late-round pick in Fantasy drafts given his current projections of about 12-4-2 under normal circumstances.

### **Amir Johnson, PF, TOR**

Johnson limped to the finish line last year and underwent surgery on his left ankle in the offseason. That said, he's expected to be completely healthy entering 2011-12 and is looking forward to continuing his Fantasy breakout. Johnson was a pleasant surprise for the Raptors and Fantasy owners last year as he averaged career highs with 9.6 points, 6.4 rebounds, 25.7 minutes and 54 starts. Although Johnson did prove inconsistent at times, he was very valuable when Reggie Evans went down with a foot injury. With Evans back, however, the Raptors are crowded at Johnson's position with the likes of Ed Davis, Julian Wright, Sonny Weems, Linas Kleiza and Joey Dorsey all similar players on the roster. We doubt he's going to get over 25 minutes per game again and that means Johnson will go back to being a low-end Fantasy option. He might still be worth taking very late in Fantasy drafts, but Johnson sits outside the top 60 Fantasy forwards at this point.

### **DeAndre Jordan, PF/C, LAC**

Lingering ankle and knee injuries suffered by Chris Kaman last season allowed DeAndre Jordan to get his first real chance to be an everyday starter in the NBA. He started 66 of 80 games, averaging 7.5 points and 7.8 rebounds with 1.8 blocks in those games. He will find it hard to match that type of production this season if both Chris Kaman and Blake Griffin remain healthy, but should remain a reliable source for blocks in category play and is worth drafting with a late-round pick, especially if you spent a mid-round pick on Kaman.

### **Andrei Kirilenko, SF, UTA**

Kirilenko's 2010-11 campaign was cut a bit short as he again ran into some injury troubles last season. The 30-year-old has had some problems staying healthy over the past few years, as he has missed 133 combined games, including 18 last year, since the start of 2004. Kirilenko performed about as expected when he was on the court, averaging 11.7 points, 5.1 rebounds and 3.0 assists over his 64 games. While the days of him scoring in the high teens may be behind him, he continues to fill up the box score whenever he is on the court. Kirilenko has averaged more than a steal and block in each of his 10 seasons in the league, which makes his value a little higher in category-based formats. Owners can likely expect more of the same from him heading into the 2011-12 season, as long as he can stay healthy. If he is, Fantasy owners should feel free to spend a late-round pick on Kirilenko.

### **Carl Landry, PF, NO**

After a breakout season in 2009-10 for the Rockets and Kings, Carl Landry's productivity took a step back last season. A second consecutive year with a mid-season trade saw him wind up with a Hornets team that needed to fill a void left by an ACL injury to David West. Over 23 games, he averaged 11.8 points and 4.1 rebounds. That was well below the 16.8 points and 5.9 rebounds he averaged the year before and we expect Landry will fall somewhere in between this fall. His ceiling is somewhere around those 2009-10 numbers, but Fantasy owners should expect him to remain more of a role player for now outside of an indication from his team that they intend to use him in a featured role. This makes Landry a worthwhile investment in the later rounds as a possible sleeper to break out should he find himself in a situation to play 30-35 minutes per game again, as he did during his breakout campaign. We know he can do it, if only given that chance. No matter the playing time he gets, count on him for excellent field-goal percentage, decent free-throw shooting for a power forward and a low turnover rate.

### **Rashard Lewis, PF, WAS**

Lewis put together a pretty disappointing 2010-11 campaign with the Magic and Wizards. The now-seasoned veteran was limited to 57 total games, the fewest in a decade, because of ongoing knee trouble. The 11.7 points per game he averaged was his lowest scoring output since the 1999-00 season, and he shot just 35.7 percent from 3-point range. Still, Lewis did see some increases over last season, managing better rebounding, assist and block averages despite the dip in offense. However, he clearly isn't the player he once was and at age 31 seems to have his best days behind him. With all the unknowns surrounding Lewis heading into the 2011-12 season, owners are better off considering Lewis a low-end option, worthy of a late-round pick in deeper leagues. That is of course if he is healthy.

### **Kevin Love, PF, MIN**

Kevin Love took his game to the next level in 2010-11 and posted some solid stats en route to winning the NBA's Most Improved Player award. After averaging 14 points with 11 rebounds during his sophomore campaign, he ballooned to 20.2 points and a league-leading 15.2 rebounds per contest a year ago. He was a double-double machine as he went 53 straight games recording one, falling two short of the all-time record. There are few big-men in the league that can shoot like the 22-year-old and his 41.7 percent from beyond the arc helps him get points when facing a bigger power forward. With another year of experience under his belt, Love should be able to post similar numbers in 2011-12, if not better. He will supply the low-post scoring while the likes of Ricky Rubio and rookie Derrick Williams work on the outside, but the ball will most assuredly go through the former UCLA Bruin. Thanks to his all-around production, Fantasy owners should consider Love a No. 1 Fantasy forward on Draft Day, worthy of being taken in the first few rounds.

### **Corey Maggette, SF, CHA**

Maggette's first and only season in Milwaukee was a disaster. He appeared in 67 games for the Bucks -- 18 as a starter, 49 coming off the bench -- and saw a major dropoff in production from years past. The 12-3-1 stat line he averaged was his worst since his second year in the league as he struggled to find his role in coach Scott Skiles' offense. However, Maggette is now in Charlotte -- thanks to a Draft Day trade -- and could be in line for a bounce-back season with the Bobcats. He has already been told by coach Paul Silas that he will be the team's starting small forward, which should get his minutes into the 30s on a nightly basis and he will be counted on to be one of the team's primary scorers with Stephen Jackson now out of town. While he is a proven scorer in the NBA, Maggette's injury history makes him a risky option for Fantasy owners. He hasn't played in more than 70 games in each of the last four seasons, which is something owners should take into consideration. Still, if Maggette can stay healthy, he could prove to be a nice sleeper option.

### **Shawn Marion, SF, DAL**

The days when Marion ranked among the top options in Fantasy, especially in category play, are long gone. However, they should not be long forgotten. Marion still has the ability to produce well-rounded stat lines, even if the numbers are not quite as impactful as they once were. He can still chip in about 12 points per game with healthy contributions in rebounds (6.9 rpg in 2009-10), steals, blocks, field-goal percentage and 3-pointers made. Last season, Marion stepped up with the Mavs dealing with a rash of injuries to wing players and proved that he can still be relied upon consistently in Fantasy. Best of all, you know what you can expect from Marion when given a chance at significant run. While he no longer qualifies as a regular starting option in Fantasy hoops, he certainly makes for a quality reserve option to be used as needed throughout the season. Consider the 33-year-old former Fantasy superstar a solid mid-round pick, adding quality depth to your forward position. But be aware that a healthy Caron Butler this season could take a chunk out of his potential productivity.

### **Kenyon Martin, PF, DEN**

The good news regarding Martin entering the 2011-12 season is that he's expected to be 100 percent healthy after playing in just 48 games last year due to his recovery from knee surgery. The bad news is that he will be playing in China. Martin signed a big-money deal to play in the Chinese Basketball Association this season, his contract including stipulations that would not allow him to leave once the NBA lockout was resolved. He should not be targeted in any Fantasy leagues this year.

### **Paul Millsap, PF, UTA**

After expecting to play in a reserve role last season, Utah forward Paul Millsap surprised many onlookers with arguably the best campaign of his career. The 26-year-old was thrust into the starting lineup when Mehmet Okur went down with an injury and responded by averaging a career-high 17.3 points per contest. He also averaged 7.6 rebounds, 2.5 assists and 1.4 steals starting 76 games. He also proved capable of playing alongside Al Jefferson and the Jazz are actually toying with the idea of moving Millsap to center and Jefferson back to power forward, just to keep them both in the lineup. No matter where he plays, Millsap proved he can produce when given ample minutes, which he will surely get in 2011-12. At the very least, Fantasy owners should can count on double-digit scoring totals with around 8-9 rebounds a night from the 26-year-old. He also usually kicks in a steal and block, which only increases his value in category-based formats. Fantasy owners shouldn't hesitate to spend an early round pick on Millsap on Draft Day.

### **Greg Monroe, PF, DET**

One of the few bright spots for the Pistons during the 2010-11 season was the emergence of rookie Greg Monroe. After cracking the primary rotation on January 4 with a 14-and-11 effort at the Lakers, he went on to average 12.0 points and 9.1 rebounds in 48 starts. Expect the new coaching staff in Detroit to use him in a similar role this season, making that type of production a possibility to expect out of the gate. Owners in category leagues can also benefit from over a steal per game and a high shooting percentage, but be aware of his poor free-throw shooting. Consider him a solid choice beginning in Round seven of any standard Head-to-Head points format, though he is likely to be drafted in the later rounds in Rotisserie play.

### **Anthony Morrow, SF/SG, NJ**

Morrow was playing pretty well for the Nets in his first season with the team last year before being shut down after 58 games due to lingering pain in his left knee. Getting 32 minutes of run per night, Morrow was averaging a career-high 13.2 points with 2.9 rebounds and almost two 3-pointers. Fantasy owners can expect Morrow to at least begin the season as the starting shooting guard alongside Deron Williams, but the Nets drafted MarShon Brooks from Providence and one of the college's most prolific scorers could challenge him. The knee will continue to be a lingering concern for Morrow, who is just 25 years old as he enters his fourth NBA season. He gives Fantasy owners excellent 3-point shooting and some solid scoring in general and can be targeted in the later rounds. If he doesn't lose any playing time to Brooks, Morrow should be considered a top 60 Fantasy guard.

### **Troy Murphy, PF, LAL**

Murphy is a very interesting case entering the 2011-12 season because his Fantasy value will depend very much upon where he lands. The 31-year-old Murphy started just four games last season as he battled injuries and bad situations. Murphy could land anywhere this season, except Boston, that much seems clear. The most important thing Fantasy owners should know about a guy who once averaged almost 11 rebounds per game over a two-year span with the Pacers is that he's healthy, something that could not have been said last year. A healthy Murphy could be a rebounding machine, so Fantasy owners should treat him as a major sleeper. Fantasy owners should wait until very late in drafts to get him, but could be pleasantly surprised if they do.

### **Dirk Nowitzki, PF, DAL**

Dirk Nowitzki finished 23rd overall in Head-to-Head Fantasy points last season in standard-scoring CBSSports.com leagues after he had finished among the top 12 scorers in nine consecutive seasons coming in. The reason for the mild drop had little to do with a decline in overall production (his numbers remained mostly on par), but the fact that he missed eight games due to injury to mark the season with fewest games played for Nowitzki since his rookie year. His stability as the go-to guy in Dallas has made him one of the more reliable first-round options in Fantasy hoops over the past decade -- regardless of format. As long as Dirk can remain healthy, and there is no reason going into the season to believe that will not be the case, he remains worthy of a selection in Round 2 as a player who may offer great value coming off what some may perceive to be a "down" year. While the pieces around Dirk have changed over the years, his role has not varied much at all. We expect more of the same from him in 2011-12.

### **Lamar Odom, PF, DAL**

Veteran F Lamar Odom put together one of his most productive seasons during the 2010-11 campaign and captured the NBA's Sixth Man Award as a result. His reward from the Lakers? A trade to Western Conference rival Dallas. Odom averaged 14.4 points, 8.7 rebounds and 3.0 assists while shooting a career-best 53 percent from the floor with Los Angeles. Not bad for a player who had an average draft position of 81.3 last season. Odom also shot nearly 39 percent from 3-point range as he finished as the 15th highest scoring forward in all CBSSports.com standard Fantasy formats. While Odom developed into a solid option during his tenure with the Lakers, he does have a knack for being inconsistent. The 32-year-old will come off the bench again with the Mavericks, but he always seems to find a way to get his numbers. Consider him worthy of a selection beginning in the fifth round of 2011-12 Fantasy drafts.

### **Travis Outlaw, SF, SAC**

Outlaw saw a nice increase in minutes last season in his first with New Jersey and he started a career-high 55 games for Avery Johnson's Nets. Outlaw put up 9.2 points, 4.0 rebounds and almost a 3-pointer per game over 29 minutes last season and the Nets want him to show up in much better shape heading into 2011-12. Outlaw could likely begin the season as a starter for the Nets, though he did last year and ended up back on the bench by the end. GM Billy King isn't sure what Outlaw's role will be to begin the year and that makes him a low-end option in Fantasy. He can be considered a top 80 Fantasy forward, but he'll need to prove himself. If you grab him in Fantasy drafts, make sure it is very late as Outlaw is no certainty to contribute with all the moving pieces in New Jersey.

### **Paul Pierce, SF, BOS**

The 33-year-old Pierce doesn't have any designs on slowing down entering 2011-12 as he improved upon his numbers from 2009-10 last year. Pierce picked up his production all around as he scored 18.9 points, grabbed 5.4 rebounds and dished out 3.3 assists per game while shooting a career-high 50 percent from the field. While GM Danny Ainge mentioned he could eventually become a bench player, limiting his minutes, that won't happen this year. If the Celtics want to win, the offense will keep going through Pierce and Pierce will continue to produce as one of the best Fantasy forwards in the NBA. His Big Three teammates of Kevin Garnett and Ray Allen are still around and the Celtics shouldn't change the way they play too much. Still durable at his age after playing 80 games last year, Pierce remains a top 15 Fantasy forward and someone to target in the early rounds of most Fantasy drafts.

### **Tayshaun Prince, SF, DET**

The Pistons are one of the hardest teams to forecast heading into the 2011-12 regular season, but Tayshaun Prince should be easy to peg. His numbers have not varied much at all over the last seven seasons and even with a new coaching staff in place Prince should be in line for just about the same numbers again this season. Since 2004, Prince has averaged 13-14 points, 4-5 rebounds and 2-3 assists per game without fail with minimal variations in shooting percentages, blocks, steals or turnovers. Go ahead and look at his numbers. Like what you see? Barring a drastic change in scenario, that is just about what you are going to get. Expect him to once again serve as a viable low-end play in most standard formats as long as he can remain healthy. He won't be a difference maker, but his reliability can be very useful to Fantasy owners.

### **Zach Randolph, PF, MEM**

Zach Randolph has averaged 20 points and 12 boards per game over his last three seasons and seems a lock to maintain that level of production in 2011-12, barring an injury. He has kept off the court issues from being a distraction during his time with the Grizzlies and when taken simply for what he can do on the court, he ranks among the top forwards in the NBA. Not much should change up front for the Grizzlies, with Marc Gasol and Randolph working well off each other. Randolph remains the go-to guy in Memphis and should remain a safe pick in Rounds two or three of any Fantasy format.

### **John Salmons, SF/SG, SAC**

John Salmons will return to the Kings, two seasons after he was traded away. But while he averaged 18.3 points, 4.2 rebounds and 3.4 assists over 53 games in his last go-around with the Kings, there won't be as many touches to go around this time. Tyreke Evans, if and when he is healthy, is now the team's go-to option in the backcourt. DeMarcus Cousins is developing into a terrific scorer up front. The team also added J.J. Hickson and Jimmer Fredette in the offseason and Salmons might find himself in a similar situation to the one he was in while with the Bucks last season, though the Kings do play in a much more wide-open offensive system. Salmons offers a very diverse stat line for owners in category leagues, offering useful production in every category outside of blocks. So while an expected stall in productivity might make him worthy of no more than a pick in the eighth or ninth round in standard Head-to-Head formats, he may go a couple of rounds higher in category play.

### **Samardo Samuels, PF, CLE**

Samardo Samuels was thrown into action last January after not being in the picture for much of the first half of the season. The results were promising. Playing just over 25 minutes per game last March, he averaged 11.9 points and 5.8 rebounds, showing flashes of potential for the future. This season, he'll have to fight for playing time once again, but could develop into a potential starting power forward on a Cavaliers team without much depth at the position. Samuels will not be in line for enough playing time going into the season to target in most Fantasy drafts as anything more than a late-round flier, but he has shown the ability to produce when pressed into action. That makes him worthy of a look.

### **Luis Scola, PF, HOU**

With Yao Ming out of the picture in Houston, Luis Scola has become the team's interior presence. The 31-year-old will be entering his fifth NBA season coming off a career-high 18.3 points and 8.2 rebounds per game. Barring significant changes under the team's new coaching staff, Scola should once again average over 15 shot attempts per game to allow him to remain within the same scoring range. After playing 82 games in each of his first three NBA seasons, he did battle the injury bug last season for the first time in his career as he missed eight games. Count on him for a shooting percentage above 50-percent from the floor to go with the solid scoring and rebounding. However, he will not offer much else to owners in category leagues, making him more of a mid-round pick. In standard head-to-head formats, he remains worthy of a pick no later than Round 4. The Rockets selected a power forward, Marcus Morris, with the No. 14 overall pick in the NBA draft this offseason, but Morris is expected to shift to more of a small forward role at the NBA level.

### **Josh Smith, PF, ATL**

Smith will once again enter the 2011-12 season as high-end Fantasy forward, especially in category-based play. The 25-year-old proved again to more than capable in the blocks and steals department, averaging a 1.6 and 1.3 per contest in the two categories, which are typically the two hardest categories to peg down in Rotisserie formats. When you combine those with the career-best 16.5 points, 8.5 rebounds and 3.3 assists he put up last season, owners will be hard pressed to find a better all-around option. However, the knock on Smith continues to be a reluctance to play to his potential, at times settling for too many jumpers when his game is better suited for playing near the rim. The Hawks have talked some about moving him to small forward, which would allow him to use his size on smaller defenders. No matter where he plays, Smith will be worthy of a pick in the third or fourth round in Head-to-Head formats. Although, he should go earlier in category-based formats.

### **Amar'e Stoudemire, PF, NY**

The only two concerns Fantasy owners should have with Stoudemire entering 2011-12 are the health of his back and how he's going to divide the scoring with Carmelo Anthony. We'll start with the positive news that Stoudemire should be 100 percent when the season opens. The negative – if it can be called that – is that Stoudemire's production did drop when Anthony and Chauncey Billups arrived at Madison Square Garden from Denver. After averaging 26.1 points, 8.6 rebounds and 2.2 blocks per game before the All-Star break, Stoudemire went down to 23.5 points, 7.3 rebounds and 1.3 blocks after. Coach Mike D'Antoni surely spent the entire offseason devising an offensive scheme that would allow the Knicks to maximize Stoudemire's value with Anthony in the fold and you can bet the dynamic duo have a big season in a wide-open high-flying offense. Owners have to assume that Stoudemire's overall numbers may drop a bit, but he'll remain one of the best Fantasy forwards/centers in the game. Center eligibility gives Stoudemire an added value and keeps him going within the first round in most Fantasy drafts.

### **Tyrus Thomas, PF, CHA**

Thomas' 2011-12 campaign was a short one as injuries limited him to just 41 games during the season. He played in just seven games after the All-Star break before finally being shutdown at the end of March because of a meniscus tear in his left knee. Thomas was fairly productive when he did play, averaging 11.1 points, 5.8 rebounds and 1.6 blocks per game in the 34 games prior to the break while shooting 47 percent from the field. He is also shot 81.4 percent from the charity stripe and is expected to be 100 percent healthy in time for training camp. However, with coach Paul Silas already backing Corey Maggette as his starting small forward, Thomas will likely be coming off the bench next year. That means Fantasy owners should expect more of the same from the 24-year-old. He most likely will average somewhere in the low-double digits in scoring but continue to fill up the box score with rebounds, steals and blocks. As long as he is healthy, Thomas should be considered a solid Fantasy reserve, who is worthy of a late-round pick in most Head-to-Head formats. However, his value remains slightly higher in category-based formats.

### **Jason Thompson, PF, SAC**

The additions of DeMarcus Cousins and Samuel Dalembert last season, took a bite out of Jason Thompson's progression in his third NBA season. After experiencing improvements across the board in his sophomore NBA season in 2009-10, he suffered career lows in scoring average (8.8 ppg), rebounds (6.0 rpg) and blocks (0.6 bpg) all while playing less than he did in each of his first two campaigns. This year, the addition of J.J. Hickson could add to those statistical frustrations, though coach Paul Westphal has mentioned during the offseason that he would like to get Thompson more involved. In 239 starts last season, Thompson averaged just 9.6 points and 6.1 rebounds and was simply not featured enough to be as productive as he was his first two seasons. We do not anticipate that to change much this season, barring injuries, making Thompson merely a late-round pick in Fantasy drafts. However, among late-rounders, Thompson may be one of the more capable bigs available under the right circumstances.

### **Klay Thompson, G/SF, GS**

The Warriors drafted another shooter to go with Stephen Curry and Monta Ellis. Guess what? He doesn't play defense either. Thompson is expected to at least begin the season coming off the bench. He has been called by some the best pure shooter in the draft and led the Pac-10 last season with 21.6 points per game. At 6-foot-7, he is versatile enough to play some small forward, but he is also blocked by another solid player in Dorell Wright there. Thompson will be worth a late-round pick in seasonal formats, but he has some decent intrigue for owners in long-term formats.

### **Hedo Turkoglu, SF, ORL**

Turkoglu was once again a disappointment last season, despite playing in both Phoenix and Orlando. Many thought the 32-year-old would be in line for a breakout season when he signed with the Suns but that was not the case. That trend continued when he was traded to the Magic, as Turkoglu was unable to find his role in head coach Stan Van Gundy's offense. Some of those struggles can be attributed to his health, as the veteran dealt with numerous back and elbow issues throughout the year. However, Turkoglu could be poised for a bounce back season in 2011-12. He is expected to remain in the starting lineup and has been urged to shot the ball more frequently. He will also be used as more of a point-forward for the Magic, which should help get the ball in his hands more and lead to more shot attempts. While Turkoglu's best days in Orlando may be behind him, owners should expect the veteran to get his scoring back up into the mid-teens. Combine that with the four rebounds and assists he normally averages and owners should have no qualms about spending a mid-round on the 32-year-old.

### **Anderson Varejao, PF/C, CLE**

Anderson Varejao's 2010-11 campaign was a short one. He played in only 31 games after suffering a torn tendon in right ankle back in January. However, he was productive during his short time on the floor, averaging a career-best 9.1 points, 9.7 rebounds and 1.2 blocks per contest. He also shot better than 50 percent from the field (52.8) for the third straight season and saw more than 30 minutes a night for the first time in his career. While Cleveland is still in the process of remaking their roster, Varejao is expected to be a big part of the team's future. He is expected to once again be inserted in the starting lineup and should be able to at the very least retain his value from last year. The fact that the 29-year-old proved capable of posting a double-double on a nightly basis makes him an intriguing option heading into next season. However, he will be a slight injury risk after undergoing surgery to repair the tendon in his ankle. While he is expected to be ready by the start of the regular season, there is always a chance his recovery takes more time. Still, if he can return at 100 percent, Fantasy owners should view him as mid-round selection on Draft Day. He holds more value in formats that allow dual eligibility.

### **Charlie Villanueva, PF, DET**

Going into his seventh NBA season, Charlie Villanueva has shown flashes of being a potential NBA star without being able to sustain that level of production. After the 2008-09 season with Milwaukee, when he averaged a career-best 16-2-7 stat line, it appeared he had finally arrived as a premier NBA power forward, but his move to Detroit stunted his development. He has averaged 11-1-4 in two seasons with the Pistons, but a coaching change could finally provide him with the stability he has failed to enjoy for the better part of his career. He heads into the season atop the team's depth chart at power forward and should get every opportunity to be relied upon as a primary option again. If he takes advantage, a return to his 2008-09 numbers could be in the cards. However, Fantasy owners should not put too much stock into that happening. Do not consider drafting him until the late rounds as a reserve with mild upside.

### **Gerald Wallace, SF, POR**

Gerald Wallace's numbers took a little hit last season, although there are plenty of reasons to believe he will be able to bounce back in 2011-12. The 29-year-old averaged 15.7 points, 8.0 rebounds and 2.4 assists over 71 games last season with the both the Bobcats and Blazers, but played much better after he was dealt to Portland. Although Wallace initially was not happy about being dealt, he was able to quickly fit into coach Nate McMillan's offensive scheme and saw his scoring numbers and shooting percentage go up after the trade. That trend should continue heading into next season, as he should be much more in tune with the offense heading into his first full season in the Western Conference. While Wallace won't need to be the main scoring presence that he was back in Charlotte, he will still be counted upon to provide consistent scoring from the wing position. He is expected to be in the starting lineup, so at the very least, owners should be able to count on another year of mid-teens scoring with around 8-9 rebounds per night. Combine that with the 1.5 steals and block a game he has been averaging and it is easy to see why Wallace is such an attractive Fantasy option, especially in Rotisserie formats. Fantasy owners should have no qualms about spending a middle to late round pick on Wallace on Draft Day.

### **David West, PF, IND**

Despite not being able to do much on the court because of an injury, that didn't slow down veteran F David West off of it this offseason. West, who had surgery in early April to repair a torn ACL, signed with Indiana in mid-December following eight seasons with New Orleans. He is unlikely to play during the abbreviated preseason and his status for the start of the regular season is in question. There is also concern that he might not be able to reach his usual levels of production in his first season removed from the injury. However, his potential to average in the high teens in scoring and more than seven boards per game makes him worth the risk. The only downside: he will no longer be playing with star G Chris Paul this season. Consider him a quality selection beginning in the seventh round of 2011-12 Fantasy drafts, but just be aware of the injury risk.

### **Derrick Williams, F, MIN**

Derrick Williams was taken No. 2 overall in the NBA Draft by the Timberwolves this offseason and is expected to make an immediate impact in Minnesota. While the T-Wolves will likely have to go with a smaller lineup to accommodate the former Arizona Wildcat, his scoring and athletic ability will be well worth it. He is expected to compete with Wesley Johnson, Michael Beasley and Anthony Randolph for playing time at the forward spot. The 19-year-old averaged 19.5 points with 8.3 rebounds in his sophomore season at Arizona while shooting 59 percent from the field. He also shot 56 percent from beyond the arc, which will help him out early in his career. Fantasy owners know to temper their expectations with rookies, especially tweens like Williams, but the upside is huge. He should be considered a No. 4 Fantasy forward in standard leagues, and he's worth drafting with a late-round pick. In dynasty/keeper leagues, Williams can be drafted with a mid-round selection, and he should be considered a Top 5 option in rookie-only formats.

### **Marvin Williams, SF, ATL**

Williams turned in another underwhelming season during the 2011-12 campaign. The former University of North Carolina standout was limited to just 65 games as he dealt with a flurry of minor injuries last year. He was once again used more as a role player than a go-to-guy, which limited his production to a mediocre 10-5-1 stat line. With the Hawks likely to bring back the same base roster next year, owners should expect more of the same from Williams. He will likely average somewhere in low double figures with around five rebounds per contest while seeing around 30 minutes a night. Once again owners should consider him a quality reserve option worthy of taking with a late-round pick in most formats. While Williams may never end up having the "breakout" year many have been waiting for, his production has been consistent enough to know what to expect from Williams on a regular basis.

### **Dorell Wright, SF, GS**

There was no better 3-point shooter in the NBA last season than Dorell Wright. The only player in the NBA to attempt over 500 shots from beyond the arc, he made a league-best 194 in 82 games played as he enjoyed a breakout season in his first season with the Warriors. After years of getting inconsistent playing time with the Heat, he flourished in Golden State's wide-open system. This year, with Mark Jackson taking over as the new head coach of the Warriors, there is some concern that the team will slow down their offensive approach some. Wright's extraordinary season from beyond the arc may have inflated Wright's Fantasy appeal in Rotisserie formats to the point where he could be drafted much earlier than he should be and Fantasy owners should adjust expectations to take into account a possible decline in overall shot attempts this year. With that in mind, Wright will remain a very attractive option in category formats for what he can offer in 3-point shooting and steals with solid scoring and rebounding production. He should be targeted in the middle rounds in standard Head-to-Head formats, but could go as early as Round 2 or 3 in category leagues given last season's efforts.

### **Thaddeus Young, PF, PHI**

Young had a very solid bounce-back season last year for Philadelphia as he finished third in the NBA Sixth Man of the Year balloting. Young only started once last year but averaged 12.7 points, 5.3 rebounds and 1.1 steals per game over 26 minutes while playing all 82 contests. Unfortunately for Fantasy owners, it seems the bench role is one to which he's best suited, and that certainly won't maximize his Fantasy value. The 23-year-old should continue to be more of a role player for the Sixers with Elton Brand, Andre Iguodala, Jrue Holiday and even Evan Turner the preferred offensive weapons. At such a youthful age, Young certainly has the ability to improve his stars, but that remains to be seen. He's going to continue to help Fantasy owners in scoring, rebounding, steals and field goal percentage and that should be good enough to target him with a late-round draft pick. Consider him just inside the top 50 Fantasy forwards on Draft Day.

## Guards

### [Arron Afflalo, SG, DEN](#)

Despite playing in a career-low 69 games last season, Afflalo burst onto the Fantasy scene in the games he did play. Averaging 33.7 minutes per game and starting all season, Afflalo, a defensive specialist, put up career highs in scoring, rebounding and assists with a 12.6/3.6/2.4 line. Pretty much everything Afflalo did last season ended up in a career high for the former UCLA standout. That said, we are not sure the 26-year-old has giant upside for an improvement. He's certainly not going to be one of Denver's top options in the offense and we don't see a huge increase in production from the fifth-year player. His numbers waned a bit once Denver added depth after trading Chauncey Billups and Carmelo Anthony. Afflalo should begin getting Fantasy consideration on Draft Day in the later rounds as he's considered just inside the top 50 Fantasy guards heading into the season.

### [Ray Allen, SG, BOS](#)

Allen actually managed to increase his scoring production last year as the original Big Three of Allen, Kevin Garnett and Paul Pierce kept rolling right along at their elder ages. Allen went from 16.3 points per game in 09-10 to 16.5 last year. In fact, just about all of Allen's Fantasy production improved last season. While that bodes well for another good year for the former UConn standout, at 36 years old owners have to assume time is going to catch up to him soon. The Celtics just gave Allen a new contract, and the veteran treats his body like a temple. Allen can still shoot with the best of them and the NBA's all-time 3-point leader will continue to give owners some of the best percentages for a guard. While we can't call him one of the NBA's elite any longer, Allen is definitely one of the best 30 guards in Fantasy heading into next season.

### [Gilbert Arenas, PG, FA](#)

Gilbert Arenas actually got off to a good start last season, averaging 17.3 points, 5.6 assists and 1.4 steals in 17 games for Washington. However, the bottom really fell out after he was traded to Orlando back in December and Arenas was never able to get comfortable playing for the Magic. He struggled to run coach Stan Van Gundy's low-post offense and finished averaging just 8.0 points and 3.2 assists in 49 games in Orlando. Injuries were also a factor, as Arenas' troublesome left leg forced him to miss 12 contests. While the 29-year-old is clearly not the player he once was before knee injuries robbed him of his explosiveness, Arenas did prove he still can be an effective option in the right situation. However, it remains unclear if playing for the Magic is a good fit for the veteran. Arenas needs to have the ball in his hands to create offensively while Van Gundy wants everything run through Dwight Howard with his shooters lurking on the perimeter. Hibachi will have to make some adjustments to his game heading into next season while likely continuing to come off the bench. It is tough to make a strong case for Arenas based on his track record over the last few seasons but he did show flashes of his old self in Games 4 and 5 of Orlando's playoff series against Atlanta. He is also expected to work with highly regarded trainer Tim Grover and vowed to come back healthier and stronger. Fantasy owners should plan on drafting Arenas with a late-round pick in 2011-12. Still, a motivated and healthy Arenas could definitely make the veteran a possible sleeper candidate heading into next season.

### [Trevor Ariza, SG/SF, NO](#)

Trevor Ariza has been a fringe option in Fantasy leagues throughout his career, but he proved during the 2010-11 postseason that he has the ability to be more than that by averaging 16-7-3 over the team's six-game series loss to the Lakers. A defensive hound, he can always be relied upon to average more than a steal per game, but the rest of his production depends upon the way he is used offensively. He averaged 13.9 shot attempts per game in his best statistical season in 2009-10 with the Houston Rockets, resulting in a 14.9 ppg scoring average. In his first season with the Hornets, his shot attempts dropped to 10.2 per game, resulting in a scoring average that dipped to 11.0 per game. An injury to David West created a need for him to step up offensively late last season and he proved once again that he is up to it when needed. Going into the 2011-12 season, there remains a question mark as to how much he will be needed to step up offensively, but Fantasy owners should consider him a solid value pick in the later rounds as a player who could conceivably average around 15-6-4 with over a steal and a 3-pointer made per game under the right circumstances.

### [D.J. Augustin, PG, CHA](#)

Augustin got a chance to prove his worth during the 2010-11 season and performed about as expected. The 23-year-old averaged 14.4 points and 6.1 assists during his first season as a starter while appearing and starting in all 82 games. However, Augustin didn't get off to a great start last year, struggling to find his role in coach Larry Brown's offense scheme. It wasn't until Paul Silas took over that Augustin began to really flourish. He increased his scoring by nearly three points per contest under the tutelage of Silas and was able to do so without his field-goal percentage taking a major hit. Many believe Augustin has not reached his ceiling yet and could see another significant increase in his scoring now that Stephen Jackson is out of town. It doesn't hurt that Silas has also signed on for another year, so at the very least, owners should be looking another year of mid-teens scoring with around six assists per game. He could get pushed for minutes by Kemba Walker during some point in the season, but Augustin is once again expected to be the catalyst for Charlotte's offense. Fantasy owners should consider him a solid No. 3 guard with some upside, worthy of a mid-round pick on Draft Day.

### [Leandro Barbosa, SG, TOR](#)

Barbosa is entering his second season with the Raptors after spending the first seven years of his NBA career in Phoenix. He played in 58 games last season and averaged 13.3 points per game over 24 minutes per night. Barbosa is largely a scoring guard as he'll give you at least a 3-pointer per contest. He's not big on rebounds, assists or steals and he doesn't shoot particularly well from the field. Barbosa is an established NBA veteran and his playing time will be shared with the likes of youngsters Jerryd Bayless, DeMar DeRozan and veteran Jose Calderon. If Bayless takes off, Barbosa could become obsolete. For that, his upside and Fantasy value are limited. Consider him a very low-end Fantasy guard who could see his value maximized only as a waiver wire mid-season pickup in case of injury.

### [Jose Juan Barea, PG, MIN](#)

Is J.J. Barea on the verge of a breakout? Probably not while Jason Kidd and Jason Terry are both on the Mavericks' roster and healthy. However, Barea has carved out enough of a niche to be considered a worthwhile addition in deeper Fantasy leagues despite playing time that will not surpass 20 minutes per game on most nights. A solid outside shooter and an adequate passer, Barea is trusted by the Mavs to run the offense during those instances when the first unit needs a breather. The result last season was a career-best 9.5 points and 3.9 assists with nearly a 3-pointer per game. Consider him adequate insurance for Kidd in deeper formats, but we suspect Barea will be mostly waiver wire fodder again this season.

### [Nicolas Batum, SG/SF, POR](#)

Nicolas Batum averaged a career-best 10.1 shot attempts per game last season, his playing time increasing due to an injury-riddled campaign for Brandon Roy. While Roy will remain a focal point for the Trail Blazers this season, there remain huge question marks surrounding what level of playing time he will be able to handle this season due to his chronic knee issues. That should allow Batum to step into a similar role this year, playing 30-plus minutes per game and providing scoring in the low-to-mid teens. He is an above-average 3-point shooter who has chipped in about 1.5 3-pointers per game the last two seasons and should also contribute about four or five boards per contest. Count on him for just under a steal and a block per game with solid free-throw percentage, making him a solid reserve to target as a player you will likely be able to use on and off throughout the season. Under the right circumstances, he could even break out to become more than just a role player.

### [Jerryd Bayless, PG, TOR](#)

Bayless came over from New Orleans last year and provided a nice little spark for the Raptors in 60 games and 14 starts. Bayless averaged 10 points, 4.0 assists and 2.5 rebounds per game over 22.4 minutes and the 22-year-old put GM Bryan Colangelo on notice that he expects to keep progressing as one of the team's go-to options in the offense. That said, Colangelo has said an improvement in his defense will go a long way to getting Bayless on the court more often. Until he can do that, the team will continue to need the services of Jose Calderon. Toronto might prefer a backcourt of Bayless and DeMar DeRozan due to its youthful exuberance, but until Bayless proves a two-way player, Calderon will continue to get starter's minutes. While this creates large upside, it also brings a lot of uncertainty to Bayless' season. With Calderon starting, Bayless will only be a contributor. If Bayless grabs the starting gig, he could be so much more. Bayless has sleeper value on Draft Day and should immediately be considered a top 75 Fantasy guard.

### **Marco Belinelli, SG, NO**

Marco Belinelli is coming off a breakout season of sorts in 2010-11, his first with the Hornets. Appearing in 80 games (69 of them starts), he averaged double figures in scoring and finished among the top 20 overall in the NBA in shooting percentage from beyond the arc and 3-pointers made. That should continue to be his claim to fame in Rotisserie formats and category leagues and a chance to remain the team's starting shooting guard should allow him to average in the neighborhood of 25-30 minutes per contest for as long as he can hold down the job by remaining productive. Consider him worthy of a late-round pick in any format, with his value being highest in category play.

### **Mike Bibby, PG, NY**

Veteran G Mike Bibby turned in his least productive season as a pro during the 2011-12 campaign, which saw him play for three different teams. The 33-year-old joined yet another team in the offseason and will serve as the backup point guard for New York. Bibby failed to produce in all three cities last year and averaged a career-low 8.6 points and 3.3 assists per contest. The only part of his game that Bibby was able to remain productive in was his 3-point shooting as he shot a strong 44.0 percent from downtown, including 45.5 percent during his brief tenure with the Heat. While his best days are clearly behind him, Bibby could find regular playing time if Toney Douglas misses time with an injury. Still, Bibby is not worth a selection in most 2011-12 Fantasy drafts, but he could prove to be a valuable addition off the waiver wire later in the season.

### **Chauncey Billups, PG, LAC**

After years of running the point for several teams, including New York and Denver last year, G Chauncey Billups will cede the position for the 2011-12 campaign. Billups, who was released by the Knicks with their amnesty clause, was claimed by the Clippers and will slide over to shooting guard after Los Angeles acquired Chris Paul. The veteran averaged 17.5 points and 5.5 assists in 21 games with the Knicks, but shot just .403 from the field. Billups could take some time transitioning to his new role, and he has drained at least 42 percent of his 3-point attempts only three times in his career (.389 career clip). While age might start catching up to him, the 35-year-old remains a top-30 Fantasy guard in all formats and should be taken beginning in the early middle rounds of 2011-12 drafts.

### **Aaron Brooks, PG, PHO**

After averaging 19.6 points and 5.3 assists per game in 2009-10 with the Rockets, Aaron Brooks appeared to be on the verge of joining the elite class of young NBA point guards that includes the likes of Deron Williams, Derrick Rose, Russell Westbrook and Rajon Rondo. However, a slow start in 2010-11 and an injury opened up the door for Kyle Lowry and the Rockets saw fit to deal Brooks to the Suns, where he'll serve as Steve Nash's backup until he's ready to call it a career. Barring an injury or a trade involving Nash, Brooks is likely to be limited to no more than around 20 minutes per game. In 25 games with the Suns last season, he averaged just 9.6 points and 4.2 assists per game. Clearly capable of much more, Brooks has been reduced to being a player to stash in keeper leagues or a handcuff option for Nash owners. He's one twisted ankle away from returning to Fantasy stardom, though, and could be a wise investment with a late-round pick for those owners with some patience.

### **Kobe Bryant, SG, LAL**

Kobe Bryant put together another solid year in 2010-11, despite dealing with several injuries. He was once again bothered by ankle, knee and finger issues, but somehow managed to play in all 82 games and averaged 25.3 points, 5.1 rebounds and 4.7 assists per contest. While that was Bryant's lowest scoring output since 2003, he still finished in the top five among all guards in terms of Fantasy points and did so while averaging nearly three minutes less than his career average. However, there are big changes expected in Los Angeles this season, as Phil Jackson and the triangle offense are officially retired and Mike Brown is in. Still, Brown made it perfectly clear that this is Bryant's team and he will continue to get the ball in the sweet spots of the court. Brown will try and run the offense through 7-footers Andrew Bynum and Pau Gasol more often, but Kobe will still get his touches and should have no problems retaining his status as an elite option. The 15-year veteran did have another procedure on his troublesome right knee during the offseason, although that shouldn't surprise many people. Bryant's knee may not ever be at 100 percent at this point in his career, but the one thing we have learned is never doubt Kobe. He always seems to find a way to stay on the court and be productive not matter what is ailing him, proven by the fact that he has started all 82 games three of the last four seasons. While he might be getting a little long in the tooth, Bryant remains a must-start option worthy of a first-round pick on Draft Day.

### **Chase Budinger, SG/SF, HOU**

Chase Budinger will go into the 2011-12 NBA season with a chance to be the team's regular at small forward, which could result in his breakout campaign in NBA Year No. 3. A very capable outside shooter, he should average double figures for the first time in his NBA career with even a modest increase over his 22.3 minutes per game averaged last year. He may have to fend off the likes of rookie Marcus Morris if he becomes more of a wing player in the NBA, but is a true value pick as a sleeper with upside in the later rounds. Count on him for 3-point help and free-throw percentage in category play, though he typically does not drive enough to get to the line more than a couple of times per game.

### **Will Bynum, PG, DET**

Will Bynum has shown the potential to be an above-average NBA point guard, but seems destined to be a role player. The addition of Brandon Knight with the eighth pick in this summer's draft likely reduces Bynum to a third-string role this season, barring injuries. That should mean even less playing time than he received in 2010-11, a season in which he averaged just 18.4 minutes per game. Don't sleep on Bynum, however. He averaged 16-3-2 with 1.8 steals per game in five starts last season and is capable of that type of productivity if given the chance.

### **Jose Calderon, PG, TOR**

For years it seemed that Calderon was on the cusp of being a top-notch point guard in the NBA. Unfortunately, since scoring 12.8 points and dishing out 8.9 assists in 2008-09, Calderon has done nothing but shrink into also-ran status. The 29-year-old Spaniard played 31 minutes per game last year but dropped just 9.8 points. He did see an increase in assists back to 8.9 after dishing out just 5.9 the year prior, but his shooting percentages dissipated. All the while, Toronto has moved on and settled on DeMar DeRozan and Jerryd Bayless as the team's new exciting youthful backcourt. Expect DeRozan and Bayless to see the bulk of the starts and playing time in 2011-12 and expect Calderon to play around the 68 games he's played in three consecutive seasons. Because Calderon is a veteran, there will be stretches where he plays exceedingly well. Still, he's not the future for the Raptors and shouldn't be considered as such. Calderon enters the year as a player to be taken late in drafts. He can be considered just outside the top 40 Fantasy guards, though he has limited upside to improve past that.

### **Vince Carter, SG, DAL**

Father time has finally caught up to Vince Carter, and it doesn't seem likely that he will be able to shake away. Troubled by achy knees throughout the 2010-11 season, Carter suffered through career lows in 22 games with the Magic before being traded to Phoenix and putting up even worse numbers. He averaged just 13.5 points, 3.6 rebounds and 1.6 assists in 51 games for the Suns. He'll likely be behind Jared Dudley on the depth chart, at least to begin the 2011-12 season, and may only be able to help Fantasy owners in brief spurts from this point on in his career, but the former Fantasy superstar still has some 20-point efforts left in the tank under the right circumstances. Consider him worthy of a late-round pick as a reserve, but don't hold your breath waiting for a renaissance at age 34.

### **Mario Chalmers, PG, MIA**

Mario Chalmers' third year in the league was his least productive -- at least from a Fantasy standpoint. He averaged career lows in every major offensive category across the board, including points (6.4), assists (2.5) and field-goal percentage (39.9 percent). While the addition of LeBron James and Chris Bosh didn't do much for the 25-year-old last season, Chalmers seems to have some momentum to build off of heading into next year. He was able to regain his starting job during the Heat's postseason run and got a ringing endorsement from Pat Riley as the team's starter heading into next season. Miami did draft point guard Norris Cole, although the job appears to be Chalmers' to lose -- again. Still, most of the touches will run through Dwyane Wade, James and Bosh, which will continue to limit his offensive production, despite starting. While Chalmers may be useful in spurts during a hot streak, he once again is a player worth avoiding in the majority of formats on Draft Day.

### **Wilson Chandler, SF, DEN**

Chandler will not play in the NBA in 2011-12 as a result of signing a deal to play in China. Unlike other countries who left an open-door policy for NBA players to play overseas during the lockout, the Chinese Basketball Association would only allow players to come over to the NBA who committed to play an entire season in China. So while Chandler worth stashing in long-term formats, he will not be of use to Fantasy owners in any seasonal leagues. He was having a career season in New York last year as he averaged 16.4 points, 5.9 rebounds and 1.3 blocks per game with almost two 3-pointers per contest over his first 51 games. His numbers did not stay at that lofty level after being traded to Denver, however. In his final 21 games with the Nuggets, of which he started 19, Chandler was down to 12.5 points, 5.0 rebounds, 1.1 blocks and 1.2 3-pointers per game while playing nearly five minutes less per contest.

### **Norris Cole, F/PG, MIA**

With the Heat looking for help at point guard, Norris Cole could see significant playing time as a rookie. Mario Chalmers is currently the only other point guard on Miami's roster, which is why Miami targeted the 6-foot-2 guard out of Cleveland State. He averaged a 22-6-5 stat line during his senior season but will be asked to be more of a distributor playing alongside LeBron James, Dwyane Wade and Chris Bosh. While the potential for him to produce is there, Norris can still likely go undrafted in the majority of formats heading into next season. However, owners are advised to monitor how he fares along the way. If he starts seeing decent minutes, Norris could prove to be a very solid pickup off the waiver wire. In the meantime, Cole should only be drafted with a late-round pick in dynasty/keeper leagues and rookie-only formats.

### **Darren Collison, PG, IND**

Darren Collison was definitely a disappointment during his first year with the Pacers. After putting up an impressive 18.8 points and 9.1 assists during his rookie campaign in New Orleans, many were excited about the promise of Collison being a starter in Indiana. However, the 23-year-old was somewhat of a bust, averaging just 13.2 points and 5.1 assists during the 2011-12 season. He shot nearly seven percentage points lower from behind the arc and had a hard time learning Indiana's offensive sets. Now Collison could be in danger of losing his starting gig, as George Hill was brought in from the Spurs. Hill is expected to challenge Collison for the starting point-guard role, but could still steal some of his minutes even if he comes off the bench. There is also the possibility the club opts to use both on the court at the same time, which would allow Collison to continue and see significant minutes. While many feel he does have the talent to become a top-tier Fantasy guard, there are way too many unknowns surrounding his current situation heading into next season. Based on what we now right now, Collison would be worth a mid-to-late round pick in all formats on Draft Day.

### **Mike Conley, PG, MEM**

Mike Conley has improved upon his numbers in each of his four NBA seasons. If that trend continues, Conley could find himself among the elite guards in Fantasy by the end of the season. While he is not a standout in any particular category, he can contribute significant numbers in two of the more valuable categories in Fantasy hoops: steals and dimes. He career highs in both categories (1.8 steals, 6.5 assists) last season and should approach 15 points per game this season if he stays on the same track of improvement he has followed. View him as a safe choice around the fifth round of any Fantasy format.

### **Jamal Crawford, PG, POR**

Veteran G Jamal Crawford saw a huge drop in production during his second year in Atlanta last season. Crawford averaged just 14.2 points, 3.2 assists and 1.7 rebounds, but still managed to ink a two-year deal with Portland in the offseason. He struggled shooting the ball last season, especially from behind the arc, as his 34.1 shooting percentage from downtown was his lowest mark since 2006-07. However, the 31-year-old should bounce back with the Blazers as he earns plenty of minutes with his new team. He's one of the few perimeter scoring options for Portland and should see roughly 15-plus shots a night. Despite his down campaign, Crawford should be viewed as a premium source for 3-point shooting and scoring, making him worthy of a mid-round pick in 2011-12 Fantasy drafts.

### **Jordan Crawford, SG, WAS**

Washington knew what they were doing when they traded Kirk Hinrich to Atlanta for Mike Bibby and Jordan Crawford. Wizards president Ernie Grunfeld insisted that Crawford be included in the trade and now we know why as the 22-year-old showed what he can do when given an opportunity to play. He started 16 games for the Wizards as Nick Young was banged up near the end and averaged 16.3 points, 3.9 assists and 3.0 boards per contest over that stretch. However, his value hinges on whether the Wizards bring Young back. If Young is on the roster and healthy, he'll likely return to the starting lineup, which would put Crawford back on the bench. Although, he would still be a part of the team's rotation and see more time than he did in Atlanta. Owners should keep an eye on where he lands on the depth chart heading into training camp next fall. Assuming he'll be the team's sixth man, Crawford would be worth taking in the mid-to-late rounds on Draft Day.

### **Stephen Curry, PG, GS**

Despite being plagued by ankle injuries throughout the 2010-11 season, Stephen Curry was able to improve upon his stellar rookie season by averaging an outstanding 19-6-4 stat line over 74 games. He underwent ankle surgery in the offseason and should be 100 percent by the start of the season, but could deal with lingering ankle issues throughout his career. Curry could face some changes under new coach Mark Jackson, especially with the addition of rookie shooting guard Klay Thompson. However, Curry should continue to be featured in the offense with about 14 to 15 shots per game, including around five attempts per game from beyond the arc. He has averaged at least two 3-pointers made per game throughout his first two seasons in the NBA and is a premium shooter from the foul line. Despite his long-range game, he also offers excellent field-goal percentage and is a prominent source for steals. His only negative may be his high turnover margin, but that is not enough to knock him out of the first two rounds of most standard formats.

### **Baron Davis, PG, NY**

Veteran G Baron Davis enters the 2011-12 campaign surrounded by uncertainty. Despite the possibility of Davis missing a huge chunk of the season because of a back injury, he signed with New York after being released by Cleveland and could start for the Knicks once he returns. Davis embraced the chance for a fresh start with the Cavaliers last season and averaged 13.9 points and 6.1 assists following a trade from the Clippers. But Davis missed time due to his nagging left knee and back spasms. The 32-year-old might not return to the court until late January with the current setback. Fantasy owners should be wary of selecting him in 2011-12 drafts and target him only in the later rounds of most leagues.

### **DeMar DeRozan, SG, TOR**

The 22-year-old DeRozan absolutely broke out in his second NBA season out of USC last year with the Raptors. Toronto needed a steady scoring presence in the backcourt and DeRozan gave it to them as he averaged 17.2 points per game over 35 minutes, both monster jumps from the season prior. Unfortunately, outside of scoring, DeRozan's game was lacking in several areas last season as he shot poorly and only contributed 3.8 rebounds, 1.8 assists and a steal per night. The athletic guard has the potential to contribute so much more, however, and continues to bring sleeper appeal into the season. The Raptors have a lot of contributors, but no real Fantasy stars. DeRozan has the ability to be that type of player in Fantasy and owners should begin taking him in the middle-to-late rounds. Consider DeRozan right on the fence of the top 40 Fantasy guards heading into the 2011-12 season.

### **Toney Douglas, SG, NY**

Douglas became a double-digit scorer for the Knicks last season as an NBA sophomore. The former Florida State star averaged 10.6 points per game with 3.0 rebounds and 3.0 assists. He also picked up a steal and almost two 3-pointers per contest in more than 24 minutes per night. Even more impressively, Douglas' numbers actually improved dramatically after Carmelo Anthony and Chauncey Billups came over from Denver as New York lost a lot of contributing players in the deal and asked Douglas to step up. Douglas scored 13.4 points per game with 4.5 assists after the All-Star break. If he continues down that line, Douglas could have big-time sleeper appeal in Fantasy. Of course, the Knicks drafted Iman Shumpert, who could challenge his role in the offense. Douglas should still be given plenty of playing time, however, and can be targeted with a late-round draft pick as a top 70 Fantasy guard.

### **Mike Dunleavy, SG, MIL**

Dunleavy's 2010-11 campaign was once again cut short due to injuries. This time it was a thumb injury, which sidelined the veteran for 20 games and cost him his starting gig. Still, Dunleavy was able to improve on his totals from a season ago, averaging 11.2 points, 4.5 rebounds and 1.7 assists during his 61 games on the floor. The biggest reason for Dunleavy's turnaround can be attributed to his improved shot. The 30-year-old shot 46 percent from the floor, including 40.2 percent from downtown, which was a fairly significant increase from his previous two seasons. While he is expected to once again be a starter heading into the 2011-12 season, Dunleavy's inability to stay healthy continues to hurt his value. He has missed a total of 98 games over the last three seasons, so there is reason for owners to be hesitant about spending a pick on him. When healthy, Dunleavy can be counted on for low-end double-digit scoring totals to go along with a healthy amount of rebounds. He also averaged almost two 3-pointers a game, which gives him some traction in deeper category-based formats. While he is far from one of the elite options out there, Dunleavy can be considered a solid reserve on plenty of teams. Consider taking him with a late-round pick in deeper formats on Draft Day.

### **Monta Ellis, SG, GS**

Monta Ellis has been one of the better scorers in the NBA over the past two seasons. Relied upon heavily in the team's offense under Don Nelson and Keith Smart, he has averaged over 20 shots per game in that span. With a new coach in town this season, there is some uncertainty as to whether or not that will continue. Fantasy owners should also keep in mind that, along with the possibility the Warriors might reel in their running game some under new coach Mark Jackson, the team also drafted a shooting guard (Klay Thompson) with the 11th overall pick in the draft. Ellis should be able to overcome both of these potentially negative factors, but Fantasy owners should account for a possible slight decline in his touches this year. Regardless, his premium scoring, solid assist and steals production and excellent 3-point shooting should have him going late in Round One or early in Round Two in any format.

### **Tyreke Evans, SG, SAC**

Tyreke Evans was plagued by plantar fasciitis in his left foot last season, limiting him to 57 games. The injury forced him to play at less than 100 percent even when he was able to withstand the pain enough to play through it, causing a dip across his stat line compared to what was a highly productive rookie season. It affected his shooting to the point his field-goal percentage dropped from 45.8 percent as a rookie to 40.9 percent. An offseason of rest and recovery should go a long way toward getting Evans back to the point he may be able to improve upon, or at least match, his rookie production and Fantasy owners who are not scared away by concerns of his ailment lingering may be able to land him at a very reasonable price late in the second round or early in the third. At full strength, Evans should average over 20 points per game. He may be asked to play more point guard this season with Beno Udrih out of town, but his role alongside rookie Jimmer Fredette is something that could change over the course of the season. Expect around five or six assists per game with a healthy amount of steals. Beware of his high turnover rate, however.

### **Jordan Farmar, PG, NJ**

Normally when a 24-year-old NBA player has a career season, you can expect him to keep improving. That may not be the case for Farmar. The UCLA product came over from the Lakers last year and posted career numbers in more than 25 minutes per game with 9.6 points, 5.0 assists and 1.5 3-pointers a night. That said, New Jersey's point guard situation was a mess due to injuries to Devin Harris early and Deron Williams late and Farmar ended up making 18 starts. He'll be limited to backup duty in 2011-12 behind Williams and will need another injury to get him the playing time he was blessed with last year. Plus, the Nets drafted guard MarShon Brooks, who could take away some of his playing time as well. Consider Farmar mostly just a handcuff to Williams entering the season and only target him very late in Fantasy drafts. He's certainly a top 100 Fantasy guard, but we don't have a lot of hope that he repeats his production from a season ago.

### **Raymond Felton, PG, POR**

Raymond Felton had an interesting 2010-11 campaign. He was predicted by many to have a breakout season with the Knicks and he didn't disappoint. Felton got off to a red-hot start in New York, averaging 18 points and 8.9 assists over the first 32 games of the season. However, that all changed when he was dealt to the Nuggets at the trade deadline back in February. Felton found himself coming off the bench in Denver and saw his production take a big dip, as expected. He averaged 11.5 points and 3.6 assists during his 21 games in the Rocky Mountains, while being used solely as a reserve. Now Felton will take another crack at starting, after being dealt to Portland in a draft day deal in June. Still, that doesn't mean he is going to light it up like he did last season in New York. Portland plays more of a half court game -- much like the Bobcats -- so we would expect the 27-year-old to put up numbers similar to his cumulative totals last season. He averaged 15.5 points, 8.3 assists and 1.7 steals during his 75 games, which would make him more than a viable Fantasy guard in most formats. Target Felton as a solid mid-round selection in most Fantasy formats on Draft Day.

### **Rudy Fernandez, SG, DEN**

After stating he did not want to compete for playing time in Dallas, G Rudy Fernandez was shipped to Denver just before the start of the season. He will enter his first season with the Nuggets after three unspectacular seasons in Portland. With the Blazers, he was used mainly as a bench option and played roughly 25 minutes per game while contributing along the perimeter. Fernandez is capable of being a strong option from 3-point range for Fantasy owners in category-based leagues and can also contribute a quality free-throw percentage. With Denver, Fernandez is worthy of a late-round pick in standard formats with enhanced value in category-based leagues for his 3-point prowess.

### **Jonny Flynn, PG, HOU**

A former lottery pick, Jonny Flynn will have to earn his time off the bench in his first season with the Houston Rockets. Kyle Lowry enjoyed a breakout season last year, allowing the Rockets to trade away Aaron Brooks and deem Lowry their point guard of the future. Lowry will have the job to lose in 2011-12, so Flynn will likely be looking at no more than around 20-25 minutes per game in a best-case scenario. He averaged 13.5 points and 4.4 assists as a rookie while playing just over 28 minutes as Minnesota's primary point guard, but struggled to get into form last season after offseason hip surgery that pushed his debut to mid-December. Flynn is by no means a lost cause, but he is also not worthy of drafting until the late rounds of Fantasy leagues given his limited chances to make an impact going into the season.

### **Randy Foye, SG, LAC**

Randy Foye suffered career lows across the board in 2010-11, his first season with the Clippers. However, given the chance to start when injuries struck the team's backcourt last season, he showed he can still be counted on to be a contributor. He averaged 16.1 points, 4.0 assists and 2.2 rebounds in 24 starts, averaging 1.9 3-pointers made per game and 1.3 steals. Extended over a full season, that type of production would qualify Foye as a solid pick in the middle rounds of any Fantasy format. However, outside of injuries to Mo Williams or Eric Gordon this season, that playing time will not be available to him. He'll be worthy of a late-round pick in leagues where he can be stashed as a reserve. Owners who select Gordon or Williams would be wise to invest in him as an insurance policy.

### **Jimmer Fredette, G, SAC**

Jimmer Fredette led the nation in scoring last season playing for BYU and he will be one of the rookies getting the most attention in Fantasy drafts. However, keep in mind that he will be on a team loaded with guards like Tyreke Evans and Marcus Thornton. He'll may be used as a source for scoring off the bench and as a perimeter role player, though he and Thornton could go back and forth as the season goes on. He'll be most useful in Rotisserie formats as a source for 3-pointers, but is not somebody we would suggest investing much more than a late-round pick on outside of keeper leagues. He can put the ball in the basket, but he likely won't average more than 10 shots per game in his rookie season. In keeper leagues, he will be worthy of a mid-round investment.

### **Manu Ginobili, SG, SA**

Well rested, Manu Ginobili enjoyed one of his best NBA seasons at age 33. The Argentine guard reaped the benefits of no international duty during the offseason to play in 80 games for the first time in his nine-year career. He finished 27th overall in standard-scoring Head-to-Head formats last season, but carries a great deal of inflation risk going into the upcoming season. At 34, the chances of him improving upon these numbers seem slim. And with a summer filled with more games for the Argentine national team, those chances seem even slimmer. Count on him to average over 15 points per game with quality production across the stat line. Outside of blocks, Manu remains a plus in just about every category and remains worthy of a pick among the top 60 overall, just be sure to temper expectations some.

### **Ben Gordon, SG, DET**

It seems like forever ago that Ben Gordon averaged over 20 points per game while playing for the Bulls. That happened over 82 games of the 2008-09 regular season, his final year in Chicago. Since joining the Pistons, he has seen his scoring decline each year, reaching a low point at 11.2 points per game last season while averaging just 26 minutes per game. Sharing a backcourt with Richard Hamilton and falling victim to John Kuester's questionable playing rotations just about eliminated Gordon from the realm of useful Fantasy options, but the 28-year-old seems more than capable of a bounce-back season if given the opportunity for a prominent role again. Kuester is gone, but the Pistons' backcourt remains crowded and, as a result, Gordon should be selected as no more than a reserve option with the ability (if not the opportunity) for a resurgence this season. If he even approaches his Chicago numbers, Gordon could become one of the late-round steals of this year's Fantasy hoops drafts. When allowed to do his thing, Gordon has been reliable for premium 3-point shooting, high free-throw percentage and above-average scoring.

### **Eric Gordon, SG, NO**

The only thing that seemed to slow down G Eric Gordon during the 2010-11 season was a wrist injury. But with a new team and renewed health, Fantasy owners should expect him to continue to improve in his fourth NBA season. Gordon was shipped to New Orleans in a multiplayer deal for G Chris Paul just before the start of the season. He averaged 22.3 points for the Clippers last year, but missed 26 games. However, his wrist is fully healed and he should once again average more than 20 points per game with solid assist totals as a member of the Hornets. In category-based formats, he can also be a premium source for 3-pointers and is good for roughly a steal per game. He will likely be the focal point of the Hornets' offense and is worthy of a selection beginning in the third round of 2011-12 Fantasy drafts.

### **Richard Hamilton, SG, CHI**

In one move, veteran G Richard Hamilton went from the worst Fantasy environment (Detroit) to one of the best (Chicago). Hamilton was waived by the Pistons in the offseason after he clashed with then-coach John Kuester last year that resulted in his removal from the team's rotation. He resurfaced in March to prove that he could still be entrusted with a high shot volume and he could return to Fantasy prominence again this season. A season removed from averaging 18.1 points per game, Hamilton will certainly benefit along the perimeter because of the slashing presence of Bulls G Derrick Rose. If Hamilton returns to a prominent role, he can once again be trusted to contribute solid numbers from beyond the arc and is worthy of a selection in the middle rounds of 2011-12 Fantasy drafts.

### **James Harden, SG, OKC**

Harden continues to fly just slightly under the radar. Make no mistake, however, Harden will enter the 2011-12 season as the Thunder's No. 3 scoring option. After only starting five games last season, despite playing in all 82, Harden is expected to be Oklahoma City's starting two-guard entering the year. Likely getting a boost from the 26.7 minutes per game he played last year as a 21-year-old, the Arizona State product could easily improve upon the 12.2 points, 3.1 rebounds, 2.1 assists, 1.1 steals and 1.4 3-pointers he recorded per game last season. Harden exploded in the second half of the season as he posted 15.8 points per game over his final 28 regular-season contests. After an excellent playoffs, Harden is ready for a monster third NBA season. Harden's upside as a starter has him a solid Fantasy sleeper leading up to Draft Day. He's worth taking with a mid-round pick in all formats and should be considered on the cusp of being a top 50 Fantasy guard.

### **Devin Harris, PG, UTA**

Devin Harris performed about as expected last season, averaging 15.2 points and a career-high 7.1 assists over 71 games for the Nets and Jazz. After playing the first 54 games in New Jersey, Harris was shipped west in exchange for Deron Williams. While injuries once again forced the 28-year-old to miss some time, he was able to regroup at the end of the season and finish strong. Now Harris will be asked to run the point for the Jazz, which is something he is more than capable of doing. While many are hoping the change of scenery can re-ignite some of the magic he possessed during the 2008-09 campaign, Harris should at the very least be able to match his overall production in New Jersey. That means Fantasy owners will most likely be looking at around 15-18 points and 7-8 assists on a nightly basis, to go along with a handful of rebounds and a steal or two. However, many feel Harris will be able to increase his assists totals in the desert, especially with so many proven low-post scorers at his disposal. Harris figures to be more in line with the Jazz's plan heading into next season and should be an early-to-middle round selection on Draft Day.

### **Gerald Henderson, SG, CHA**

Henderson burst on the Fantasy scene last year after putting together a breakout second half of the season. The 23-year-old was thrust into the starting lineup following the trade of Gerald Wallace and made an instant impact with his ability to score. The former Duke product put together six games of 20-plus points -- including a career-high 32 on April 6 -- over the 25 games post-trade and scored in single digits just six times over that stretch. With the Bobcats in a bit of a rebuilding mode, Henderson is expected to remain in the starting lineup heading into the 2011-12 season. As long as he can get around 30 minutes a night, Fantasy owners should expect him to score somewhere in the low-teens. However, Henderson had surgery over the summer to repair a torn labrum and there is a chance he won't be ready for camp, which makes him a slight injury risk. If he can return at 100 percent and ward off rookie Kemba Walker from stealing his minutes, Henderson would be worth a late-round pick in all leagues on Draft Day.

### **George Hill, PG, IND**

After spending his first three seasons in San Antonio, George Hill will at least start the 2011-12 season in the Eastern Conference. The 25-year-old was shipped off to the Pacers in exchange for Kawhi Leonard in a Draft Day deal back in June. Hill served primarily as Tony Parker's backup with the Spurs, only starting five games last year. However, he averaged a very impressive 16.8 points, 4.4 assists and 3.4 rebounds in those contests and is expected to challenge Darren Collison for the starting gig in Indiana. However, it is very possible Hill continues to come off the bench with the Pacers, as he has proved more than capable of being a productive reserve. Hill averaged 11.6 points and 2.5 assists almost exclusively off the bench last season while shooting 45 percent from the field. The club could also opt to use him at shooting guard as he has the size and length to defend the position. While Hill's value will largely depend on whether he starts or not, he should still see significant minutes either way. As long as he gets around 20-plus minutes a night, owners should expect his scoring to be somewhere in the low-double figures to go along with a handful of dimes. As of right now, Fantasy owners should consider Hill as a solid Fantasy reserve worthy of a late-round selection in most formats on Draft Day. However, his value would increase if he was named a starter.

### **Kirk Hinrich, PG, ATL**

Hinrich joined the Hawks in a trade last season and immediately took over the starting point guard role. However, his production remained fairly unchanged from his time in Washington. The veteran out of Kansas averaged just over 10 points per contest for the second straight year to go along with 4.0 assists and 2.5 rebounds. However, an injury during the playoffs provided Jeff Teague with an opportunity to play, so Hinrich may be coming off the bench next season. Either way, Teague will likely steal minutes away from the 30-year-old, which is why he will enter the season as merely a Fantasy reserve, worthy of a late-round selection in most formats. However, Fantasy owners should continue and monitor how the Hawks split up minutes between the two. While Hinrich doesn't normally offer high-end production, his diversified stat line gives him some value in deeper formats when he sees quality minutes.

### **Jrue Holiday, PG, PHI**

Holiday was one of the most improved guards in Fantasy between his rookie and sophomore seasons in the league. Coach Doug Collins played him 35 minutes per game and he improved all around as he averaged 14 points, 6.5 assists, 4.0 rebounds, 1.5 steals and a 3-pointer per game in a breakout season for the 76ers. Now, Holiday comes back for his third year with a nice young nucleus in Philadelphia. With a fully healthy Elton Brand and Andre Iguodala, you can expect Holiday to become even more effective passing the rock. He vowed to work on his turnovers in the offseason, so that could be a much-improved area of his game after finishing 44th in the NBA in assist-to-turnover ratio last year. Holiday started all 82 games for Philadelphia and proved highly durable, finishing as a top 12 Fantasy guard. Just 21 years old, Holiday should only improve this season and should be targeted in the early middle rounds on Draft Day.

### **Kyrie Irving, G, CLE**

Rookie G Kyrie Irving is undoubtedly a huge part of the future in Cleveland. However, it's unclear how much the Cavaliers will lean on the top overall pick in the previous NBA Draft this season. Cleveland waived veteran G Baron Davis in December so Irving could be thrown right into the fire. (The Cavaliers still have Ramon Sessions at point guard.) Either way, Irving is likely to receive plenty of playing time as long as he's healthy and his role should continue to expand as the season progresses. A very capable scorer at Duke, Irving should average double figures in scoring. Fantasy owners shouldn't expect Steve Nash-type production in assists immediately, but he could easily average four to five dimes per game with sufficient playing time. While his value is higher in keeper leagues, Fantasy owners in seasonal formats should temper their expectations for the rookie. Invest a mid-round pick in Irving as a possible low-end starter, but don't expect him to carry your team in 2011-12.

### **Jarrett Jack, PG, NO**

Jarrett Jack is among the top backup point guards in the NBA and, as such, will make for one of the better handcuff options in Fantasy hoops again this season. Fantasy owners who select Chris Paul in Round 1 could get an above-average insurance policy in Jack in the late rounds. Jack averaged 12-5-4 over 15 starts last season, including over a steal per game. He offers high-end free-throw shooting and will be useful in spurts this season even in his backup role. So while he should not be targeted until possibly the last couple of rounds in any Fantasy draft, he should be considered a worthwhile investment.

### **Stephen Jackson, SF/SG, MIL**

Stephen Jackson had an up-and down season during his first full year in Charlotte. The seasoned veteran had to deal with injuries and a rash of other distractions and saw his numbers fall across the board during the 2010-11 campaign. Jackson averaged 18.5 points, 3.6 assists and 4.5 rebounds per contest while appearing in 67 games for the Bobcats. That marked the first time since 2006 that he did not average at least 20 points per game. However, he now finds himself back in the Central Division for the first time since his Indiana days, as he was part of the three-team trade made on Draft Day that landed him in Milwaukee. Despite some initial grumbings that Jackson wasn't happy about being traded again, the 33-year-old reportedly is excited to be playing with the Bucks. It's unknown whether he will start at guard or forward, but either way, Jackson should be able to retain similar Fantasy value to what he had with the Bobcats. Perhaps another change of scenery will do him some good and many think Jackson could be in for a big year, if he can stay healthy. At the very least, owners should once again be able to count on around 20-points per night with a healthy number of rebounds, assists and steals. That type of production warrants Jackson being worthy of an early round selection on Draft Day.

### **Brandon Jennings, PG, MIL**

Brandon Jennings' sophomore season was a trying one as injuries and inconsistency were the themes during his second year in the league. After getting off to a red-hot start to the season, Jennings suffered a foot injury in December, which required surgery and cost him 19 games. It took him a while to back into the groove once he did return, but Jennings finished strong and still wound up averaging 16.2 points and 4.8 assists per game last season. While he has shown flashes of brilliance during his brief career, Jennings has yet to develop into an elite Fantasy option. He still goes through too many offensive lulls where he struggles to shoot the ball and he will definitely need to improve his assists-to-turnover ratio, which was 4.8-to-2.3 a season ago. However, keep in mind he is only 21 and did not go to college, opting to play overseas for a year. Many feel Jennings has not even come close to reaching his ceiling yet and his raw talent and ability to put up big-time scoring numbers continue to make him an intriguing option. At the very least, Jennings should be able to give owners around 15 points per night to go along with around five assists and a steal. That type of production makes him worthy of a mid-round pick with upside in most formats on Draft Day.

### **Joe Johnson, SG, ATL**

Johnson had his worst statistical season as a Hawk in 2010-11, despite signing the richest contract in the league last summer. The normally always consistent Johnson averaged just 18.2 ppg while shooting just 44 percent from the field, 80 percent from the foul line and a putrid 29.7 percent from downtown. This was the first time since 2004 that he failed to average 20 points per game or makes at least 119 3-pointers, although he was pretty beat up last season. Johnson dealt with various thumb and elbow issues last year and had arthroscopic surgery on his right elbow back in December. He was supposed to be sidelined 4 to 6 weeks with his injury, but may have rushed back as he returned after only missing nine games. Now healthy, there is no reason why Johnson shouldn't be able to bounce back in 2011-12. Expect the 30-year-old to get his scoring back up into the 20s while still managing to average around five rebounds and assists per contest. Johnson is also usually good for around two 3-pointers a night, making him a very diverse option for category-based formats as well as Head-to-Head leagues. Consider him a high-end No. 1 guard worthy of a pick in the second round of most Fantasy formats.

### **Jason Kidd, PG, DAL**

Jason Kidd is entering his 18th NBA season and he still remains among the elite guard options in Fantasy. The reason? Kidd has averaged at least eight assists per game each of the last 16 years, a quality that catapults his value in Rottisserie formats and also in standard-scoring Head-to-Head leagues that reward assists with two points. Kidd has averaged below 10 points per game in three of the last five seasons and he may not even equal the 7.9 points per game he managed last season at this point in his career, but Kidd remains capable of producing across the stat line, being a plus producer in dimes, steals and 3-point shooting. While a continued general decline should be expected we do not anticipate Kidd dropping from the ranks of the top-20 guards in Fantasy hoops. He remains a top-50 draft pick in any league, who may still be selected within the first two rounds in category play.

### **Brandon Knight, G, DET**

Many feel that Knight was a steal for the Pistons at No. 8 overall. He is one of the few players in the draft that appears to be ready to make an impact out of the gate, though his immediate prospects will depend on what the team does with Rodney Stuckey. Knight is heading into a crowded backcourt that consists of Stuckey and Will Bynum at the point and Richard Hamilton and Ben Gordon at shooting guard. If Knight was in line to be the primary point guard in Detroit, he would be our choice for the Rookie of the Year, at least from a Fantasy perspective. He can score, pass and rebound well for a guard. His shooting percentages could become a burden for owners in category leagues, however. Keep an eye on what moves the Pistons make, but we endorse a mid-round pick for Knight in seasonal formats as a potential low-end starter with upside to grow into much more.

### [Ty Lawson, PG, DEN](#)

Lawson played in 80 games for Denver last season as the team got younger and traded Carmelo Anthony and Chauncey Billups to the Knicks mid-season. That put Lawson in the spotlight as the team's new starting point guard, with Raymond Felton playing a reserve role. With the team swapping out Felton for veteran Andre Miller, the onus falls even more on Lawson's shoulders to provide leadership at the point for George Karl's Nuggets. Karl won't hesitate to move Miller into a starting role should Lawson falter, but the former UNC standout will get every opportunity to shine. And shine he did in the second half of last season. He put up 14.4 points, 6.9 assists, 3.4 rebounds and 1.4 steals per game, not to mention shooting 42 percent from 3-point range, over his final 25 games of 2010-11. Lawson will look to carry that momentum into this season as he'll begin the year as the starting PG for Denver. That alone should have him targeted just inside the top 25 Fantasy guards. He's worthy of a mid-round pick on Draft Day.

### [Kyle Lowry, PG, HOU](#)

Kyle Lowry enjoyed his breakout NBA season in Year No. 5, flourishing under Rick Adelman. In Year 6, he will have to adapt to a new coach, but he should be able to build upon what was an eye-opening first season as an everyday starter. He averaged a well-rounded 14-7-4 stat line last season, also contributing 1.7 3-pointers made per game and 1.4 steals per tilt. His play was so promising over the long haul that the Rockets decided to trade away Aaron Brooks, clearing the path for Lowry to thrive for years to come. The 25-year-old should continue to progress in his second full season as a starter, though there is some reasonable fear of a setback given the coaching change. Consider him a safe pick somewhere around Round 5 or 6 in standard formats.

### [Kevin Martin, SG, HOU](#)

After seven years in the NBA, Fantasy owners should know what to expect from Kevin Martin. He is a terrific scorer, who could rank among the top-10 NBA in that category year in and year out. However, he won't help you much in assists or rebounds. For that reason, his Fantasy appeal will remain higher in Head-to-Head scoring formats than in Rotisserie, but he can be underrated in those formats as well because of what he can offer in 3-pointers, free-throw shooting and steals. Consider Martin a safe choice within the first four rounds of any Head-to-Head format, but he may be selected a round or two later in Rotisserie play.

### [Wesley Matthews, SG, POR](#)

Thanks mostly to an injury-plagued season for Brandon Roy, G Wesley Matthews was able to emerge as a significant contributor last season for the Trail Blazers. And his productivity could improve again during the 2011-12 regular season after Roy's chronic knee troubles forced him to retire. Matthews is expected to be asked to once again carry a heavy portion of the team's offense. Given 35-40 minutes per game last February, he enjoyed his most productive month when he averaged 18-2-4 with 1.4 steals per game in a sign of his potential upside. Fantasy owners should target him beginning in Round 7 or 8 as a solid starting option in any format. Count on him for above-average 3-point shooting and steals contributions in category play.

### [O.J. Mayo, SG, MEM](#)

O.J. Mayo went through a tumultuous season in 2010-11 that saw him lose not only his role as a go-to option in the offense, but also his starting job. His scoring dipped from 17.5 points per game to 11.2 points per game, but appeared to get back in the good graces of the franchise during the team's playoff run, scoring 15-plus points in four of the team's last games as he earned himself more playing time. Mayo is fully capable of getting back to the scoring level he enjoyed during his first two NBA seasons if he can get back on the same page with the coaching staff. That will make him a value pick in the later rounds of Fantasy leagues. Available as a reserve option, he might return to being a week-to-week starter under the right conditions.

### [Tracy McGrady, SG, ATL](#)

Long gone are the days when G Tracy McGrady was a premier player, but he is still hanging around the NBA as one of the more talented role players in the league. Injuries have crippled his career over the past four years, but he continues to find work and signed with Atlanta in the offseason. McGrady will not excel in any particular category but given roughly 25 minutes a night, he can still chip in decent numbers. Last season, he averaged eight points and four rebounds per game to give owners in category-based formats a viable low-end starting option. While Fantasy owners should no longer look to him as a regular starting option in any format, he will be worth taking a late-round flier on in deeper formats.

### [Jodie Meeks, SG, PHI](#)

After two seasons riding the pine with the Bucks and 76ers, Philadelphia's Meeks finally came alive for Fantasy owners last year. Meeks started 64 games for Philadelphia and played in 74 contests total as he averaged career-highs of 10.5 points, 2.3 rebounds, 1.1 assists and a steal per game. But Meeks is best used in Fantasy as a prolific 3-point shooter. Averaging 28 minutes per game, Meeks shot 40 percent from downtown and nailed almost two 3-pointers per night. His 138 3-pointers made were the most by a Philadelphia player since Kyle Korver nailed 184 in 2005-06. Fantasy owners should be targeting Meeks late in drafts as a player who will be a solid source of 3-point shooting. He should be considered a low-end Fantasy guard and his value is higher in category-based leagues compared to head to head formats.

### [Andre Miller, PG, DEN](#)

The 35-year-old Miller has reached the twilight of his NBA career after 13 seasons. Entering his 14th, Miller looks to be out of a starting job as he moved over to the Nuggets after two seasons in Portland. New coach George Karl is ready to begin the Ty Lawson era in Denver, with Miller playing mostly a bench role and backing Lawson up. Miller has definitely been durable over the course of his career as he's played at least 80 games in each of his seasons. That fact really cannot be understated as he'll be ready to fill in for Lawson should the youngster get hurt. Miller was solid but not spectacular with the Trail Blazers last season over 33 minutes per game. He put up 12.7 points, 7.0 assists and 3.7 rebounds per game and shot 46 percent from the field. Of course, he only shot 11 percent from 3-point range and he's going to get even fewer shots with the Nuggets. Miller should still see plenty of minutes and could see even more should Lawson struggle. That said, his value is definitely as low as it has been heading into the 2011-12 season. Consider him just inside the top 40 Fantasy guards. Miller should be drafted beginning in the late-middle rounds.

### [Steve Nash, PG, PHO](#)

Steve Nash continued to defy the aging process in his 15th NBA season, averaging 14.7 points and 11.4 assists per game over 75 games. But at age 37, how much longer can that last? Nash finished seventh among all guard-eligible players in standard-scoring CBSsports.com Head-to-Head leagues last season. He failed to average 15 points per game for the first time since 2003-04 (his final season with Dallas before re-joining the Suns) and could continue to experience a decline in that aspect of his game. But his prowess as a passer should allow him to remain among the cream of the crop at the point guard position as long as he can remain healthy. He will remain a premium option for help in free-throw percentage and will also chip in about a 3-pointer made per game, but owners should consider the younger crop of elite point guards (Derrick Rose, Russell Westbrook, Deron Williams, Rajon Rondo) over him given the significant possibility that his numbers could begin to decline sharply. Once those names are off the board, however, you'll find it hard to beat what he can still offer.

### [Gary Neal, PG, SA](#)

Gary Neal showed some promise as a rookie, averaging nearly 10 points per game despite averaging less than 22 minutes per contest. A solid shooter with good range, Neal could become a mid-teens scorer under the right circumstances. However, playing time will be limited behind Manu Ginobili and Tony Parker. However, in deeper leagues he does make for a good handcuff option for either player. In category leagues, owners can count on Neal to be helpful across the shooting categories.

### [Jameer Nelson, PG, ORL](#)

Coming into the season, the main concern most had about Jameer Nelson was his durability. After all, the 29-year-old had failed to play 70 games in each of the last three years and has reached that mark just twice over his first six NBA campaigns. However, Nelson finally broke that barrier this season, appearing in 76 games and averaging 13.1 points and a career-high 6.0 assists in those contests. He averaged double-digit scoring in every month other than January and did it while shooting nearly 45 percent from the field. While Nelson has been unable to duplicate his All-Star production from his injury-shortened 2008-09 campaign (16.7 points per game on 50.3 percent shooting from the field) he should once again be good for around 12-13 points and 5-6 assists per game the way Orlando's roster is currently constructed. He could be pushed for playing time by Gilbert Arenas, although Nelson will be the starter to begin the year, which should earn him at least 25-30 minutes a night. He also continues to be a decent source for 3-point shooting and is able to do so without killing his overall percentage. Fantasy owners should consider Nelson a solid No. 4 guard, who is worthy of taking in the middle-to-later rounds in most formats.

### **Tony Parker, PG, SA**

Tony Parker is a quandary in Fantasy Basketball. Seemingly capable of being one of the top point guards in Fantasy, he is sometimes limited by the scope of his role under coach Gregg Popovich. Case and point, he averaged a career best 22 points per game during the 2008-09 season when he was allowed to shoot the ball a career-high 17.5 times per game. He has averaged no more than 17 points per game over the last two seasons while being held to below 14 shots per game. So while the ceiling remains very high across the board for Parker (he can score and pass with the best guards in the NBA), he remains a notch below the top-tier guards and should be targeted as more of a luxurious No. 2 option once the Chris Pauls, Russell Westbrook and Steve Nashes of the world are off the board. If Parker is the first guard you are looking to take in a draft, you have waited too long. In category leagues, look for him to help across the board, but he can hurt you in free-throw shooting and doesn't shoot very many threes.

### **Chris Paul, PG, LAC**

After weeks of speculation regarding where he was going to play this season, G Chris Paul finally has a new home. And it's an ideal spot for him -- and Fantasy owners. Paul, widely considered one of the NBA's premier point guards, joins budding stars Blake Griffin and DeAndre Jordan with the Clippers for the 2011-12 campaign. The 26-year-old averaged 15.9 points and 9.8 assists per game last season with New Orleans. The scoring output was a career low, but Paul will likely see that total rise as he is completely recovered from knee surgery in 2010. His assist clip certainly will see a boost as he develops a bond with Griffin and Jordan, and he's a good bet to average a double-double for the fourth time in his career. Fantasy owners should feel confident selecting him in the first round of all 2011-12 drafts.

### **Michael Redd, SG, MIL**

Michael Redd had a good portion of his prime production years wiped out due to a major knee injury and, at 32, is unlikely to even come close to the level of production he enjoyed when he averaged 20-plus points per game in six consecutive years prior to getting hurt. He has played just 61 games combined over the last three seasons and averaged just 13.4 minutes over 10 games toward the end of the 2011-12 campaign, showing very little. With a full offseason of healthy conditioning under his belt, Redd could again be asked to play a significant scoring role as a perimeter shooter. Fantasy owners should not expect him to average much more than 10 shot attempts per game, however, and his appeal in Fantasy leagues could be limited to being a source for 3-point shooting in Fantasy leagues. Double-digit scoring, possibly in the low-to-mid teens could still be within reach given 25-30 minutes per game. Take a chance on him late in drafts if you are an owner with patience and ample reserve space.

### **J.J. Redick, SG, ORL**

J.J. Redick averaged double figures in scoring last season for the first time in his career, but just barely. While he may be one of the better pure outside shooters in the game, his playing time will seemingly always be capped at about 25 minutes per contest, barring a rash of injuries in the back court. Count on him for about 1.5 3-pointers made per game in category leagues along with high free-throw percentage, but do not invest much more than a late-round pick on this role player.

### **Jason Richardson, SG, ORL**

Richardson got off to a red-hot start last season, averaging 21.0 points with the Suns through the first two months of the season. However, he was part of the mega-trade the Magic completed back in December that sent Richardson and Earl Clark to Orlando for the likes of Vince Carter and Marcin Gortat. Despite continuing to start, Richardson struggled to find his footing with the Magic, averaging 13.9 points during 55 games with the club. Now he enters the 2011-12 campaign as a free agent and is unlikely to be brought back to the Magic Kingdom. However, his value likely won't change much no matter where he lands. Owners can expect the veteran to be a consistent mid-teens scorer, whose greatest asset will be his 3-point shooting. Richardson shot 39 percent from behind the arc last season and can once again be considered a low-end option heading into next season. He is worth a late-round pick in head-to-head formats but should go earlier in category-based leagues.

### **Luke Ridnour, PG, MIN**

Ridnour experienced a resurgent campaign in his first season with the Timberwolves and saw a ton of playing time with Jonny Flynn missing the beginning of the season. He averaged a career-high 11.8 points and his 5.4 assists per contest were his highest since 2005-06. He also chipped in with 2.8 rebounds and 1.3 steals while shooting a healthy 46.8 percent from the field. One of the big differences in his game was his 3-point shooting. He set a new career mark with 81 3-pointers made and shot 44 percent from beyond the arc. While Flynn was shipped to Houston in the offseason, former first-round pick Ricky Rubio is coming over from Spain to compete for the starting point guard job. The Timberwolves would prefer Rubio be the starter over Ridnour, which will likely limit his Fantasy value. With a serious dropoff in production expected in 2011-12, consider Ridnour as a low-end Fantasy guard on Draft Day. But if the 30-year-old can hold onto his starting job, he will be worth a look in the later rounds.

### **Rajon Rondo, PG, BOS**

Sure the Celtics have the Big Three of Kevin Garnett, Ray Allen and Paul Pierce, but Rondo is the team's top Fantasy option hands down. The point guard from Kentucky will enter 2011-12 with the same ammunition he had last season, but is a year older and wiser at 25. Although Rondo posted one of his lowest career scoring averages at 10.6 points per game last year, he reached a career-high with 11.2 assists and 2.3 steals. The biggest question surrounding Rondo heading into the season will be the health of his elbow. Minor injuries have plagued Rondo and he only saw time in 68 games last year. Still, one of the NBA's best young point guards, Rondo is easily a No. 1 Fantasy guard. He'll be a nightly double-double and may be asked to improve offensively with the Big Three all one year older. Rondo should come off the board before Round 4 at the latest in all Fantasy drafts.

### **Derrick Rose, PG, CHI**

Derrick Rose brought the first MVP Award to Chicago since Michael Jordan in 1997-98 as he capped off one of the better regular seasons in recent history. After averaging 20.8 points with six assists in his sophomore season, he blossomed to post 25 points with 7.7 assists and one steal per contest while helping the Bulls reach the Eastern Conference Finals. While he was ousted by the Heat, the 22-year-old has a lot to build upon and could take his game to the next level if he continues to progress as a shooter. Although his shooting percentage fell to 44.5 percent in 2010-11, he took more shots than he ever had. And now that he has figured out how to get to the basket on a consistent basis, his 85.8 percent shooting from the charity stripe should only get better. He also shot a career-high 33.2 percent from downtown last season, making 128 3-pointers, which was over 100 more than his first two years combined. Rose could use a nice complimentary scorer to help him in Chicago but the Bulls' offense runs through him, which means he will get his stats. Based on his progression over his first three years in the league, Fantasy owners should expect Rose's numbers to increase in 2011-12 so consider him a solid first-round pick in all formats on Draft Day.

### **Brandon Roy, SG, FA**

Brandon Roy stunned the basketball world last week when he decided to retire due to re-occurring knee issues. The Blazers then exercised the amnesty clause on the 27-year old, which took his salary off their books and allowed the team to sign Jamal Crawford. Roy ends his career with career averages of 19 points, four rebounds and four assists. He was just one year removed from being one of the top players in the league, but his knees simply couldn't hold up to the rigors of being a professional athlete. In an interview with Yahoo.com, Roy's agent Greg Lawrence made it abundantly clear that Roy's retirement is a permanent one. "Brandon has no intention of returning to professional basketball," he said. "He has been instructed by several doctors that he has a career-ending injury and needs to stop playing immediately. Obviously, Fantasy owners can stay away from Roy, while he is not in the league."

### **Ricky Rubio, PG, MIN**

After spending the last four seasons playing in Europe, Ricky Rubio, the No. 5 overall pick in the 2009 NBA Draft, agreed to come to the United States this past offseason and will compete with Luke Ridnour for the starting point job in Minnesota. While he averaged just 6.5 points and 3.5 assists in 20 games with Regal Barcelona a year ago, many believe the Spaniard has the ability to be a Steve Nash-like point guard. He will be surrounded by a bunch of players that can score and should be able to facilitate the offense with his slick passing and court vision. Rubio comes to the NBA with plenty of hype and has the potential to be a sleeper in deeper leagues. Plan on drafting Rubio with a late-round pick in all formats, and in dynasty and keeper leagues he should be taken with a mid-round pick.

### **Thabo Sefolosa, SG, OKC**

The 27-year-old Swiss guard, not to be confused with those guarding the Vatican in Rome, actually had the second-worst NBA season of his five-year career last year with the Thunder. With the emergence of all of Oklahoma City's other young burgeoning talent, Sefolosa was limited to 25.9 minutes per game over 79 contests. Despite starting all 79 games in which he played, the guard put up just 5.1 points, 4.4 rebounds and 1.2 steals per game while shooting just 28 percent from 3-point range. Word is that he'll move to the bench this season with James Harden joining the starting lineup as the shooting guard. That is not going to help his Fantasy value. In fact, consider Sefolosa just waiver-wire fodder entering the 2011-12 season. He was barely a viable Fantasy option in his best NBA season and we just don't see much room for improvement this year.

### **Iman Shumpert, G, NY**

The rookie Shumpert has a chance to supplant Toney Douglas as the No. 2 point guard behind Chauncey Billups in the New York rotation this season. Coach Mike D'Antoni loves the fact that he plays tenacious defense and he did average 15 points per game in three seasons at Georgia Tech. Shumpert has the talent to take minutes away from Douglas and the possibility he plays big minutes is always there with Billups getting up there in age. Still, a lot has to go right before Shumpert can be considered a viable Fantasy option. He has some low-end sleeper value entering the season, but should not yet be targeted on Draft Day.

### **J.R. Smith, SG, DEN**

Smith improved defensively last season for the Nuggets, but that came with a step backwards in the offensive Fantasy categories. When the team traded Carmelo Anthony and Chauncey Billups to the Knicks for a bunch of contributors, Smith's numbers actually improved, despite the notion he might see less playing time. Smith has been the Nuggets' sixth man for several years now, however, and that should continue heading into 2011-12. Smith will never give you elite scoring potential, but he's solid in that department while contributing nicely across the board. Smith is usually good for a couple 3-pointers, steals and rebounds per game and that should only continue heading into this season with the Nuggets as a 26-year-old. His versatility keeps him on the cusp of being a top 50 Fantasy guard. Target him in the later rounds of Fantasy drafts.

### **Rodney Stuckey, PG, DET**

With the Pistons in flux, Rodney Stuckey is one of many question marks entering the 2011-12 season in Detroit. Not only will there be a new coaching staff in place to adjust to, but Stuckey will have to shift to shooting guard to accommodate rookie Brandon Knight at the point. Stuckey has proven very productive when provided the opportunity of significant playing time. Uninhibited, Stuckey could be relied upon for mid-teens scoring, nearly three rebounds per game and just over a steal per contest. However, the possibility exists that his production could be reduced with a move from the point during the upcoming season. That uncertainty makes him a very risky pick as a starting option. Fantasy owners should target him in the middle rounds of most 2011-12 drafts.

### **Jason Terry, SG, DAL**

Jason Terry has been one of the top sixth men in the NBA for the better part of the last four seasons. Even off the bench, the 12-year-veteran is given 30-plus minutes per game and that should continue this season barring injury. A premium source for 3-point shooting, he should average mid-teens in scoring to go with about four assists per game. He will continue to be in the mid 80s in free-throw percentage while also providing over a steal per game. Starter or not for the Mavs, Terry will be worthy of selecting as a viable starting option week-in and week-out in any Fantasy hoops format. His 3-point shooting weighs heaviest in Rotisserie formats, where he could be selected as early as Rounds 5 or 6. In standard Head-to-Head leagues, expect him to go beginning around Rounds 9 or 10.

### **Klay Thompson, G/SF, GS**

The Warriors drafted another shooter to go with Stephen Curry and Monta Ellis. Guess what? He doesn't play defense either. Thompson is expected to at least begin the season coming off the bench. He has been called by some the best pure shooter in the draft and led the Pac-10 last season with 21.6 points per game. At 6-foot-7, he is versatile enough to play some small forward, but he is also blocked by another solid player in Dorell Wright there. Thompson will be worth a late-round pick in seasonal formats, but he has some decent intrigue for owners in long-term formats.

### **Marcus Thornton, PG, SAC**

In 27 games after being traded to the Sacramento Kings from New Orleans, where he had been languishing in a bench role, Marcus Thornton exploded for a 21.3 ppg scoring average. He also averaged 4.7 rebounds and 3.4 assists, benefitting from 38.1 minutes and 17.5 shot attempts per contest. Much of that had to do with Tyreke Evans being limited due to lingering plantar fasciitis in his left foot, but Thornton made enough of an impact that the Kings will be looking to feature him prominently again in 2011-12. The likelihood that he can equal that level of production over an 82 game season does not seem likely, especially when you add Jimmer Fredette to the backcourt mix and J.J. Hickson as another capable scorer up front. But Thornton will get his fair of touches and significant minutes, which should allow him to remain significantly productive in the areas where he excelled last season -- namely scoring, 3-point shooting and steals. Temper expectations some, but look to select Thornton beginning in Round six or seven.

### **Evan Turner, SG, PHI**

Turner started 14 games in his rookie season after being selected No. 2 overall in the NBA Draft. The Sixers wanted him to make an immediate impact, but his year can only be described as underwhelming, at best. Having trouble excelling due to the added speed of the NBA game, Turner saw 23 minutes per game and averaged 7.2 points, 3.9 rebounds and 2.0 assists while shooting 43 percent from the field. Coach Doug Collins will want him to massively improve on all those areas if he's going to be a big part of the Philadelphia rotation in 2011-12. Turner should get every opportunity to prove that he's done that after the Sixers invested such a high draft pick on him. All things being equal, he's going to see more playing time than Lou Williams as Philly sees a bigger future from the former Ohio State standout performer. Turner claimed at the end of last year that he's a slow starter and he wanted to fit in with Philadelphia rather than assert himself. Collins will ask for more this year so Fantasy owners can consider him a bit of a sleeper. Entering Draft Day, owners should target him late as a top 70 Fantasy guard with very solid upside.

### **Beno Udrih, PG, MIL**

Beno Udrih is coming off his best season in the NBA. The seven-year veteran averaged career-highs across the board, including points (13.7), assists (4.9), rebounds (4.9) and field-goal percentage (50.0 percent). He averaged nearly 35 minutes a night for the Kings and seemed to thrive under the tutelage of Paul Westphal. However, Udrih now finds himself in the Eastern Conference for the first time in his career as he was part of the three-team trade made on Draft Day that landed him in Milwaukee. While it has yet to be decided, the Bucks may use Udrih alongside Brandon Jennings, which would be much like his situation in Sacramento when he played with Tyreke Evans and Marcus Thornton at times. However, Scott Skiles could use the 29-year-old off the bench, opting to use Jackson in the backcourt with Jennings. Either way, Udrih might have a hard time duplicating his success from a season ago. Milwaukee is much more of a grind-it-out team, which likes to set its offense in the half-court and work everything through the post. That is a far cry from the more free-flowing offense out in Sacramento. He most likely can be counted on to give Fantasy owners around 10 points a night to go along with five or six assists and a steal. Until his role becomes more clearly defined, Udrih can be considered a low-end Fantasy option, worth taking with a late-round pick in standard formats. Although, Udrih's ability to fill up a box score makes his value a little higher in category-based formats.

### **Sasha Vujacic, SG, NJ**

A lot of things have to go right heading into the 2011-12 season for Vujacic to repeat his performance over his final 56 games with New Jersey last year. Vujacic had played in just 11 games with 4.9 minutes per night for the Lakers when he came over the Nets mid-season. He finished very strong as he even started 17 games and averaged career-highs in scoring with 11.4 points, rebounds with 3.2 and assists with 2.3 per game over 29 minutes, also a career-high. That said, the Nets will have a healthy Anthony Morrow back and with rookie MarShon Brooks in tow, the minutes might not be the same for Vujacic. He could be someone left on waivers in most Fantasy drafts, though he does carry some sleeper appeal if he's used as he was at the end of last year.

### **Dwyane Wade, SG, MIA**

Dwyane Wade proved more than capable of retaining his status as one of the elite guards in all of Fantasy, despite the addition of LeBron James and Chris Bosh last season. While the Big Three had some problems meshing together in the early going, Wade had no problem getting his numbers and was able to avoid the significant drop-off in production that some Fantasy owners had feared. His scoring average did dip by about a point, but D-Wade still averaged 25.5 points per contest while shooting an even 50 percent from the floor. His rebounding and assists remained on par with his career numbers and he averaged over a block per contest for the third straight season. With a very shallow bench and a roster full of over-the-hill veterans, Wade and Co. were forced to carry much of the scoring load for the Heat. That is looking to be the case once again heading into 2010-11, so look for Big Three to be the team's primary source for offense once again. While it may take the Heat longer than anticipated to win a title, Fantasy owners can enter the 2011-12 campaign knowing full well what to expect from Wade. He should once again be considered a worthy of a first-round pick in all formats on Draft Day.

### **Kemba Walker, G, CHA**

The Bobcats used the ninth selection in this year's NBA Draft to select Walker out of Connecticut. Walker averaged 23.5 points during his final year with the Huskies but will most likely start out on the bench for Charlotte. The 21-year-old will likely have to beat out D.J. Augustin and Gerald Henderson for minutes but could work his way into the starting lineup at some point. His value will be highest in keeper formats, although we recommend a late-round investment in him in seasonal formats.

### **John Wall, PG, WAS**

John Wall, who was the No. 1 overall selection in 2010 NBA Draft, hit the ground running during his rookie season. Wall averaged 8.0 points and 9.1 assists through his first two months in the league before injuries began taking a toll on the 20-year-old. He dealt with numerous ankle and foot issues throughout the year as well as lingering tendinitis in his right knee that limited him to just 69 games -- 64 starts. Despite all his nagging injuries, Wall was still able to put together a very solid rookie campaign. He averaged an impressive 16.3 points, 8.4 assists and 4.6 rebounds per contest to go along with 1.8 steals and finished as the 11th highest scoring Fantasy guard in terms of Fantasy points in all CBSSports.com standard formats. That ranked him ahead of players such as Manu Ginobili, Rajon Rondo and Stephen Curry just to name a few. While there are facets of his game that definitely need polishing -- turnovers and his outside shooting being the most obvious -- there seems to be little doubt that Wall will be an elite guard in the league for years to come. He likely would have been the favorite for Rookie of the Year honors if it wasn't for a fellow named Blake Griffin and he should be able to continue to improve heading into his sophomore season, as long as he can stay healthy. Fantasy owners should not hesitate to spend an early to middle-round pick on Wall on Draft Day.

### **Russell Westbrook, PG, OKC**

Westbrook blossomed from solid contributor to Fantasy stud last season alongside Kevin Durant in Oklahoma City. The former UCLA standout poured in 21.9 points per game to go with his 8.2 assists, 1.9 steals, 4.6 rebounds and career-high 44 percent shooting from the field. Westbrook, like teammate Durant, will be just 23 for the majority of the 2011-12 campaign. Already entering his fourth NBA year, Westbrook should only continue to show improvement as he attempts to polish the finer aspects of his game while limiting the 3.9 turnovers per game he had last go-round. The more comfortable he and Durant get in sharing the spotlight, the better each players' games will become. Westbrook could conceivably pick up his assist production close to double digits. That is a scary concept as the young Thunder look to improve as a unit with Westbrook running the show. Westbrook should be considered among the NBA Fantasy elite entering the season. We like him as a possible top three Fantasy guard above such names as Kobe Bryant, Deron Williams and Steve Nash. Consider him in Round 1 in most Fantasy drafts.

### **Deron Williams, PG, NJ**

Williams is coming off wrist surgery, but that should have him 100 percent ready to have another fantastic season in his seventh in the NBA. D-Will only started 12 games for the Nets after coming over from the Jazz last season and averaged 15 points and 12.8 assists in those games. One of the game's best all-around point guards, Williams will continue to benefit from Brook Lopez down low and those assist numbers should continue to be otherworldly. You have to think coach Avery Johnson will make him even more a part of the offense and his scoring will get back to the 18-20 points per game he was putting up in Utah. New Jersey is still going to be a stumbling team this season, but Williams provides them with veteran superstar leadership. With the Nets on his back even more than the Jazz were, Williams should become an even deadlier Fantasy point guard this season. He's surely one of the NBA's elite and should come off the board right around the time names like Steve Nash, Kobe Bryant and Rajon Rondo do. Target D-Will early in drafts as a clear-cut No. 1 Fantasy PG.

### **Lou Williams, SG, PHI**

Williams was drafted out of high school so he's entering his seventh NBA season as just a 24-year-old. After starting 38 games in 2009-10, Williams became a bench role player last year for Doug Collins and the Sixers and wasn't even the top bench player on the team with Thaddeus Young considered the Sixers' sixth man. But he put together another fine season with 13.7 points, 3.4 assists and 1.2 3-pointers per game over 23 minutes per contest. Philadelphia has such a young nucleus of players that Williams' role doesn't figure to change next to Jrue Holiday, Evan Turner and Jodie Meeks in the backcourt. Williams' numbers have been consistent over his last four seasons and Fantasy owners can expect another 23-25 minutes per game this year. He certainly isn't someone to covet in Fantasy drafts, but can be taken in the very late rounds. Consider him just inside the top 70 Fantasy guards on Draft Day.

### **Mo Williams, PG, LAC**

With the Clippers' additions of points guards Chris Paul and Chauncey Billups, veteran G Mo Williams will play off the bench this season. It's unfortunate for Williams as he excelled in Los Angeles following a mid-season trade from Cleveland. With the Clippers, he returned to a more active scoring role and averaged 15.2 points over 22 games -- all starts. His assists also returned to a more typical 5.6 per game. Expect Williams to provide solid free-throw percentage and roughly 1.5 3-pointers made per contest. However, those numbers will come in a reserve role this season as he will play behind Paul. Fantasy owners should consider him an option in the later rounds of most 2011-12 drafts.

### **Nick Young, SG, WAS**

Nick Young's Fantasy value wasn't very high entering last season, as he was expected to be the backup for Gilbert Arenas. However, that all changed once the Wizards sent Arenas off to the Magic in early December. Young quickly took advantage of his increased minutes and established himself as a legitimate scoring threat. He averaged a team-high 17.4 points per game and scored 30 or more points eight times on the season, including dropping 43 on the Kings back in January. Young also averaged a career best in minutes (31.8), rebounds (2.7), assists (1.2) and steals (0.7). However, injuries limited him to just nine games over the final two months of the season, which opened up the door for Jordan Crawford. Crawford was also acquired via a trade and is expected to split time with Young at shooting guard next season. But the 25-year-old proved he can be extremely effective when given quality minutes, which should be the case even if he comes off the bench. As long as Young sees around 30 minutes a night, he can be considered a solid mid-round pick in most formats on Draft Day.
